Associate in Applied Science

Curriculum Code: 0915 (Effective Fall 2009– Summer 2014)

The trained Human Services employee assists professional staff in social service and human services agencies. The associate degree is generalist in nature, with all students acquiring an education in addictions, aging, and family. This degree is part of an enhanced career pathway into the profession. The education provides the opportunity to learn the history of human services, the necessity for a Code of Ethics, structure of community agencies, the program and services provided, and the populations served. Select general education courses compliment this degree. The mission is to teach the knowledge, values, and skills of the human service profession while providing an insightful general education. Courses are aligned with the Council for Standards in Human Service Education (www.cshse.org). For students interested in addiction, the course work is also designed to meet the educational ethics for certification as a Certified Addiction Counselor Level-I (CAC-I) of the Michigan Certification Board for Addiction Professionals (MCBAP) www.mcbap.org. Students with an interest in aging should follow the gerontology course work. A supervised consecutive two-semester practicum within a community agency provides experiential learning. Transfer opportunities exist, however **not all courses in this program transfer to all colleges**. Students planning to transfer should see the Human Services Program administrator before enrolling in any course.

NOTES:

1. Numeric graded HUSE, GERO, and SOWK courses used toward this degree must be completed with a minimum 2.5 grade or higher.
2. Students pursuing an education in addictions must select HUSE 112 from the LIMITED CHOICE REQUIREMENTS. HUSE 112 and HUSE 242 must be completed prior to practicum.
3. Students must meet with the Human Services Program administrator prior to, or during, their first semester to complete an educational plan and secure arrangements for field work experience (practicum.) Practicum application packets are available from the Health and Human Services Department, Health and Human Services Building, Room 108, beginning in January. Applications are due back to the same office by March 1 for admission into fall semester practicum.
4. Students completing “REQUIREMENTS” have fulfilled the requirements for this Core area.
5. Students may choose from the Math Core courses. MATH 112 is recommended for students planning to transfer.
6. See the MACRAO Transfer Agreement in the *Transfer Information* section for appropriate humanities and science courses.
7. Students may also choose up to 3 credits of Human Services Program electives with approval from the Human Services Program administrator.
8. Students may choose a maximum of 2 credits from different topics of special interest.

SUGGESTED COURSE SEQUENCE

Students should see course descriptions to find out when departments plan to offer courses. Students who for any reason are unable to follow the course sequence suggested below (for example, those who are part-time, have transferred in courses from another school, or have prerequisites to fulfill) should contact an academic advisor or counselor for help with adjustments.
