MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Human Services program is to provide an academic foundation and an experiential learning opportunity in the area of human services. Students will learn to creatively blend the knowledge, skills and values necessary to meet the ever-changing needs of individuals and of our communities.

HUMAN SERVICES WORK

Human service workers are individuals with specialized training as a helping professional. They assist human services professional staff, such as social workers or psychologists. They may hold a variety of positions in group homes and halfway houses; in mental health and correctional centers; in family, child and youth service agencies. Positions are also found within programs concerned with addiction, family services, domestic violence and aging to name a few. Their role may include helping others obtain services, organize or lead group activities, assist clients in mastering everyday living skills, monitor and keep records, or oversee group home residents. Job titles may include: social service technician, case management aide, community outreach worker, residential counselor, eligibility specialist or mental health technician.

THE HUMAN SERVICES PROGRAM

The Associate Degree in Human Services is designed to provide students with skills needed to enter the human services field as well as to further their education and professional development. For persons already employed in the field, it provides an opportunity to strengthen knowledge and skills to work more effectively with others and opens new job opportunities. In addition, the program can assist students who are planning to enter undergraduate schools in many human service areas. ***The degree is generalist in nature. All students receive an education in addiction, aging, family, and human services.*** Students demonstrate their learned skills and interviewing techniques during a ten hour a week, consecutive two-semester, supervised practicum in a human services agency. **Students interested in addiction** must take HUSE 112, HUSE 242 and have practicum placement in an addiction agency to meet the educational ethics component for certification from the Michigan Certification Board for Addiction Professionals (MCBAP), website at www.mcbap.com

PRACTICUM EXPERIENCE

In the final year of the program students are placed in a consecutive two-semester practicum, supervised field placement, consisting of ten hours per week in a human service agency related to their area of interest. During this practicum students develop their hands-on skills. Practicum begins fall semester only and continues through spring semester. All students are expected to complete the appropriate human services coursework with a 2.5 GPA or higher prior to enrolling in the Human Services field practicum courses. A practicum seminar accompanies the field placement. Students must submit a Practicum Application Packet to be accepted into practicum (*this application is different from the application to the Human Services Program*). PROGRAM OUTCOMES

Based on professional standards and practice, the successful student will be able to accurately

1. Analyze the issues, historical, current and future, that impact services provided by human service agencies.

DEGREE OPTIONS

CERTIFICATE OF COMPLETION

Human Services

The Certificate of Completion in Human Services is a 14 to 27-credit degree. Two courses are required with the option to choose two or more courses from human services, gerontology (aging), or program approved courses to complete the degree. This degree is beneficial for those students with a previous degree who are seeking a concentrated education in human services, and for students needing a human services focus to start their career. All courses are part of a career track, leading directly to the Certificate of Achievement and the Associate Degree in Human Services. Students interested in addition must take the classes with the asterisk *.

CERTIFICATE OF COMPLETION

Aging Studies

A 13-credit Certificate of Completion in Aging Studies is beneficial for those students with a previous degree who are seeking a concentrated education in aging, and for students needing an aging focus to start their career. All courses are part of a career track, leading directly to the Certificate of Achievement and the Associate Degree in Human Services.

CERTIFICATE OF ACHIEVEMENT

Human Services

This Certificate is 32 to 39-credits. Designed for individuals wishing to focus their education in human services and their skills in the two semester practicum. Continuing with the general education requirements will lead to the Associate Degree in Human Services. All courses are part of a career track, leading directly to the Associate Degree in Human Services. Students interested in addition must take the classes with the asterisk *.

ASSOCIATE DEGREE HUMAN SERVICES

The 63 to 65 credit Associate Degree provides the student with professional growth and development in the field of human services. Students are prepared for entry-level positions in the human service field through 25-26-credits of human services course work and 39-40 additional general education credits. A consecutive two-semester practicum enhances the student's education and skills.

TRANSFER INFORMATION

Students planning to transfer must design their individual program with one of the Program Advisors to meet the specific requirements of the transfer institution. **Separate transfer guides for a Bachelor of Social Work and similar programs** are available from a Human Services Program Advisor or from the Advising Center.

ASSESSMENT TESTING

LCC has assessment testing for reading, writing and math, as many courses require a skill level to be established in these areas prior to registering for some courses. Please contact the Assessment Center at (517) 267-5500 for further information or to speak with an assessment advisor. The Assessment Center is located in the Gannon Building (GB) Suite 2100.

NOTE:

1. Reading and writing skill levels are required for entry into HUSE 100, HUSE 105, GERO 100, WRIT 121 and many general education classes.
2. Math is required before entry into science classes.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR MY DEGREE?

The semester before you finish all of your requirements for your Certificate of Completion, Certificate of Achievement or Associate Degree you need to complete a request for graduation at the Registrar's Office. The college will check to make sure you have met all of the requirements and will contact you if there are any problems.

HOW DO I APPLY TO THE PROGRAM?

The application to the Human Services Program is available in this packet or from the Department Office located in Room 108 of the Health and Human Services Building. Please return the application to this office or mail to: Human Services Program, 3100 HHS, Lansing Community College, P.O. Box 40010, Lansing, MI 48901-7210. Applying to the program assists in your academic planning, advising process, and practicum placement. *The application to practicum is a different application and process than the program application.*

WHAT COURSES DO I NEED TO TAKE?

Specific course requirements are listed on the attached Curricular Guide:

IN WHAT ORDER SHOULD I TAKE COURSES?

Students should meet with the program advisor to plan their program in advance. The Certificate of Achievement and Associate Degree are two-year programs because of the consecutive two-semester practicum. Full-time and part-time schedules are included in this packet.

NOTE: Students **MUST** take *HUSE 105* their first fall or spring semester. This allows entrance into the practicum in the second fall semester.

Human Services coursework is not offered in summer semester. Students are encouraged to take the general education courses during summer.

- GERO 100 take during the first fall or spring semester; it is a prerequisite to GERO 203 and HUSE 282 Practicum I.
- GERO 203 (aging studies only) is offered every other year, take the first spring semester; it is a prerequisite to HUSE 282 Practicum I.
- HUSE 100 take during the first fall or spring semester; it is a prerequisite to HUSE 282 Practicum I.
- HUSE 105 take during the first during the first fall or spring semester; it is a prerequisite to HUSE 282 Practicum I.
- HUSE 112 (addiction practicum only) take the first semester in the program; it is a prerequisite to HUSE 282 Practicum I.
- HUSE 242 take the first fall or spring semester; it is a prerequisite to HUSE 282 Practicum I.
- HUSE 282 & 284 (practicum courses) with prerequisites completed and departmental approval.
- WRIT 121 should also be taken early in the program, see assessment tests for further information.

WHAT IS A PREREQUISITE?

Prerequisites are courses or competencies you must have before enrolling in a course. Check each course in the College Catalog for a prerequisite before registering. You will not be permitted to register for a course if you do not have the prerequisite.

WHAT IS THE PRACTICUM?

The practicum is a supervised field placement for a structured hands-on learning experience. Students apply their learned knowledge and skills in an actual work setting under the supervision of a human services professional. Students spend 10 hours per week in a human services agency in their area of interest. Practicum begins in the Fall Semester only and is completed through the following Spring Semester. The Human Services Practicum Coordinator will help you select agencies to explore and interview for placement. A scheduled practicum class accompanies the practicum experience on Thursday nights during each semester.

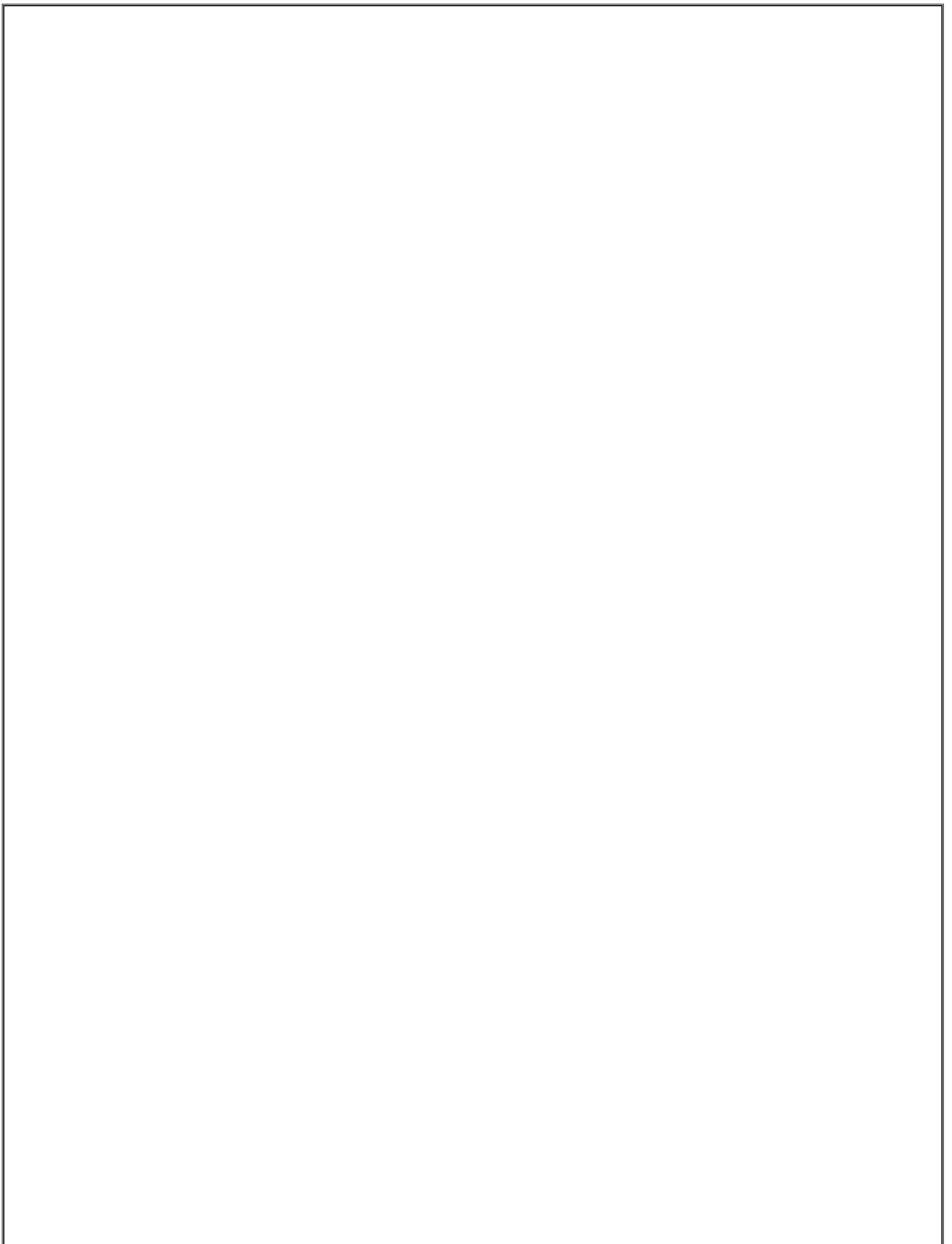
WHAT ARE THE PRACTICUM REQUIREMENTS?

NOTE: Any student with a felony or misdemeanor conviction is required to meet with a practicum coordinator, before entering into this program and/or practicum. *A criminal background check is required before acceptance into practicum.* The Human Services Certificate of Achievement and Associate Degree have a practicum requirement. Human service agencies comply with the Public Health Code Act 368, amended by Act 303, September 03, 2002. Therefore, practicum students are subject to criminal background checks and policies by these agencies. Practicum students must adhere to the agencies policies and procedures.

1. Practicum starts every Fall Semester and continues through the following Spring Semester.
2. Department approval is required for entry into the practicum.
3. A minimum overall GPA of 2.0 is required, and a 2.5 required in all GERO, HUSE, SOWK courses.
4. Completion of HUSE 100, HUSE 105 and HUSE 242 is mandatory prior to practicum for all students.
5. Completion of HUSE 112 and HUSE 242 is mandatory prior to practicum for those students desiring practicum placement in an addiction agency.
6. Completion of HUSE 110 is mandatory prior to practicum for those students desiring practicum placement working with families and children.
7. Completion of GERO 100, GERO 203, and Gerontology seminars is mandatory prior to practicum for those students desiring practicum placement working with older adults.
8. All students are required to demonstrate in writing volunteer, work, and/or life experience and how that experience has prepared them for the Human Services Program and work in the human services field.
9. All students are required to submit in writing the type agency and/or population they desire for their practicum experience.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR THE PRACTICUM?

There is an application process for acceptance into the practicum. *This is a different application than the Program Application.* The application packet is available in January from the Health and Human Services Building Room 108. Return all completed application materials to this same office by deadline date stated in the packet.

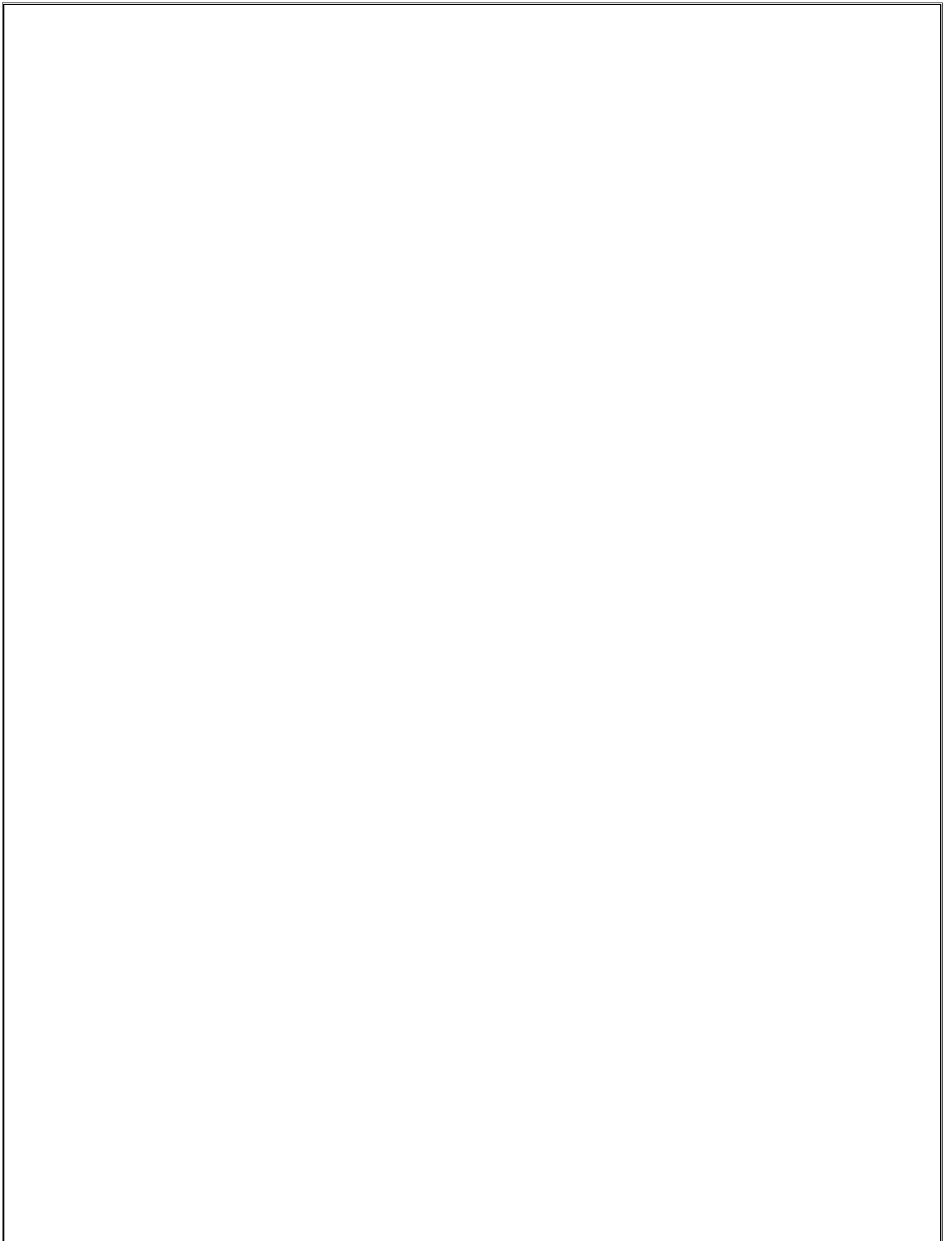

Courses

GERONTOLOGY COURSES

GERO 100: Introduction to Human Aging 3

Prerequisite: Reading Level 5 and Writing Level 4

This course provides a basic orientation to the field of gerontology, with emphasis on the aging process with respect to personal, socioeconomic and cultural issues. Death and dying are discussed. Students will learn how to access and use community resources to assist older adults and their families. (F/Sp)

GERO 131 Plan for Older adults w/Develop Disabilities .5

Prerequisite: None

This course presents an overview of the older adults with developmental disabilities including characteristics, demographics, public policy issues, and functional assessment. Michigan program initiatives are discussed and case studies are presented. (F, Sp)

GERO 164 Medication & Alcohol Use/ Older Adults .5

Prerequisite: None

This course examines medication and alcohol use among older adults including prescription and nonprescription medicines, side effects, drug interactions, and strategies for using medicines wisely. Students learn to identify a substance abuse situation and how to make appropriate referrals. (F, Sp)

GERO 165 Dementia: Concepts and Causes .5

Prerequisite: None

This course is an introduction to current concepts of dementia (Alzheimer's disease and related disorders) in older persons. It provides an overview of social, physical, psychological, and environmental factors resulting in dementia. Relationships to depression, techniques for communicating with older persons with dementia, family dynamics, and community resources are discussed, (F, Sp)

GERO 169 Legal Rights of Older Adults .5

Prerequisite: None

This course focuses upon issues such as guardianship, conservatorship, power of attorney, the living will, joint tenancy, nursing home residency, and civil commitment, including actual and perceived choices a person has as aging and illness occur. (F, Sp)

GERO 170 Depression: Recognition & Treatment .5

Prerequisite: None

This course provides an examination of depression in later life. Symptoms, causes, "masks," diagnosis, and assessment of depression are introduced, including information on distinctions between depression and dementia. Basic techniques and guidelines for working with depressed older persons are presented. (F,Sp)

GERO 171 Tech: Care for Persons with Dementia .75

Prerequisite: None

This course provides an introduction to techniques for working with older adults with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. The psychosocial needs of individuals and their families are a primary focus. Communication techniques, programming approaches, handling problem behaviors, a task breakdown approach, environmental adaptations, and role of the family are discussed. (F, Sp)

GERO 173 Activities: Older Adults w/Alzheimer's.

Prerequisite: None

This course provides an overview of planning principles and processes effective in designing meaningful activities for older adults with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders. Practice opportunities are included. (F, Sp)

GERO 191 Seminar: Special Topics in Gerontology .25-.5

Prerequisite: None

A series of seminars that address the most current issues in the field of gerontology. The seminars are designed to provide the most up-to-date information on selected subjects concerning human aging. (F, Sp, Su)

GERO 203: Physical/Mental Health Aging 3

Prerequisite: GERO 100, 2.0 minimum, or concurrently

Physical and mental health of older adults is examined from an applied perspective for human services providers. Topics include normal and pathological changes; family and social factors; skills and adaptations for maintaining good physical health; assessment; intervention; and skills for helping order adults access appropriate treatment in the health care system. (F)

HUMAN SERVICES COURSES

HUSE 100: Introduction to Human Services 3
 Prerequisite: Levels: Reading 3, Writing 4
 The course presents an overview of the evolution of human services, the services provided, and the populations served. Emphasis is on community, ethics, and skills used in diverse settings. The approach is generalist in nature. This course complies with the Ethic Standards, National Organization of Human Services. (F, SP)

HUSE 105: Personal Dynamics and Interviewing 4
 Prerequisite: Levels: Reading 4, Writing 4
 The nature of personal development, knowledge and values are examined. The potential influence on rapport is explored. Interviewing techniques of the “helping interview” are demonstrated through role playing and feedback is provided. This course complies with the Ethic Standard, National Organization of Human Services (F, SP)

HUSE 110 Intro/Child Abuse and Neglect 3
 Prerequisite: None
 This course reviews the history and scope of child abuse and neglect, including socioeconomic and psychological factors. It explores the world of abnormal rearing, roles of community agencies and disciplines, approaches to treatment and prevention, coordination of cases and services, and legal aspects and the law. (F, Sp)

HUSE 112: Understanding Substance Abuse 4
 Prerequisite: None
 Students learn the multiple factors and cycles contributing to addiction. Reasons for abuse, dependency dynamics, addiction prevention and treatment considerations are explored. Legislation is studied. Issues and treatment regarding addiction and special populations are discussed. Ethical issues include professional competency and responsibility, confidentiality, and the commitment to nondiscrimination. (F, SP)

HUSE 242: The Family: Addiction and Violence
 Prerequisites: None
 Recommended: HUSE 105 and HUSE 112
 This course provides conceptual frameworks to understand, assess, and effectively intervene/interact in a counseling fashion with the chemically dependent family. Attention is brought to the socioeconomic, cultural, and psychological factors of chemical dependency and family violence. Intervention techniques, the role of law enforcement, legislative bodies, and social service agencies are discussed. (F, SP)

HUSE 282: Human Services Practicum I 4
 Prerequisite: HUSE 105, 2.5 minimum, (WRIT 121, 2.0 minimum and Department approval). Recommended: HUSE 100 and human services experience.
 This course combines classroom training with beginning field experience (10 hours per week) in a community-based human services agency. Emphasis is on knowledge of the community power structure, funding bases, and the internal working of human services organization. Opportunities in the labor force, certification requirements, and networking are explored. (F)

HUSE 284: Human Services Practicum II 4
 Prerequisite: HUSE 282, 2.5 minimum
 This course provides classroom training on principles of human services delivery with advanced practical experience (10 hours per week) in a community-based program human services agency. Emphasis is on identifying systems and resources to link the systems with the people and how to mobilize the systems and the people. (Sp)

HUSE 293: Human Services Special Topics
 Prerequisite: Determined by Unit Section
 A number of topics related to the human service field will be taught in this course. Topics will be of interest to current students, members of the community, paraprofessionals, and professionals working in the field. Specific up-to-date content will vary with each offering (F, SP, SU)

HUSE 297: Human Services Independent Study
 Prerequisite: Department approval
 This course includes special research, directed study, or service-learning projects in human services areas, such as gerontology, social work, substance abuse, or related areas. It requires at least 16 hours of independent work for each credit. A learning contract is required. (F,SP,SU)

SOCIAL WORK COURSES

SOWK 101: Introduction to Social Work 3
Prerequisite: Reading Level 5, Writing Level 6
This course introduces the principles social work practice. Emphasis is on social work careers, description of methods, skills and standards of practice, definitions of the helping roles, survey of helping agencies and institutions, and overview of social issues and client needs relative to social work practice. (F, Sp, Su)

SOWK 205: Social Welfare 3
Prerequisite: SOWK 101, 2.0 minimum or HUSE 100, 2.5 min. Introduces the definition and concept of social welfare, its history, programs, attitudes, values, & philosophy. Emphasizes the development of private and public services, changing patterns of services, evolving changes in the Social Security Act & community action, attention to current issues in social welfare policy. (Spring Semester odd years only)
