PROGRAM HISTORY

In 1975, a local massage therapy instructor, was teaching Swedish massage therapy skills to visually impaired students at the Michigan School for the Blind. He recognized that non-visually impaired people also had an interest in learning massage therapy, so he contacted the athletic director at Lansing Community College to propose a beginning massage therapy course for the general public. The first massage therapy course at LCC was rolled out in 1976 with 18 students enrolled.

Over the years, more courses were added to the curriculum to accommodate those students who were interested in expanding their knowledge beyond the basic Swedish massage techniques. It is now a 749-758 hour certificate of achievement program utilizing the expertise of eight instructors that provides the students with the knowledge and skills necessary to sit for the National Certification Board for Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork (NCBTMB) exam.

On May 11, 2010 LCC's Therapeutic Massage Program was granted "Full Accreditation" for five (5) years by:

Based on professional and industry standards and competencies as set forth by the American Massage Therapy Association and the National Certification Board for Therapeutic Massage & Bodywork, the student, upon successful completion of the Therapeutic Massage Program, will be able to:

- complete the National Certification Exam in Massage Therapy offered through the National Certification Board for Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork;
- perform a full-body table massage using techniques drawn from a variety of modalities, with techniques and movements selected to meet the clients' individual needs and conditions;
- assess, using visual cues, interview questions, and palpation, the client's musculoskeletal, neuromuscular, and energetic states or conditions, and construct a client history noting indicated and/or contraindicated diseases, injuries, structural dysfunctions, energetic blockages, and endangerment sites;
- drape, position, and support the client on a massage table for a variety of massage situations while protecting the client's privacy and safety;
- utilize principles of body mechanics and postural self-awareness while providing massage that reduces or eliminates the risk of injury to self;
- develop and implement a system for business, accounting, and client-related record keeping;
- exhibit ethical conduct related to client confidentiality, personal/professional boundaries, and other scope of practice issues related to the massage therapy profession.

EXPECTATIONS OF STUDENTS

All hands-on massage courses have a lecture and lab component to each class. Students are required to participate in each class by both giving and receiving massage with another student. Failure to do so will be considered "nonparticipation" and the student may be administratively withdrawn from the class under the College's W Grade Policy, which can be found at: http://www.lcc.edu/policy/policies_9.aspx#W_GRADE

CREDIT HOURS VS. BILLING HOURS

A credit hour is an instructional unit carried out for the expressed purpose of eliciting some measure of educational change in a learner or group of learners. A credit can be awarded on a student's academic transcript when he or she successfully completes a unit of instruction of not fewer than 800 instruction minutes.

The cost for attending a course is determined by the courses' billing hours, instead of credit hours. A billing hour represents an amount of time that a student spends in direct contact with an instructor or with laboratory equipment. Several factors are considered in determining the billing hours of a course. The main factor is the number of hours the student is expected to either be in a class or in another "instructional" setting (such as a lab) in a typical week for a full semester course. LCC courses range from one billing hour to more than 10 billing hours per course. The billing system caps the number of billing hours that can be added to a course. For the majority of courses at LCC, the credit hours and the billing hours are the same.

A credit hour is an instructional unit carried out for the purpose of eliciting some measure of educational change in a learner or group of learners. A credit can be awarded on a student's academic transcript when he or she successfully completes a unit of instruction of not fewer than 800 instructional minutes.

MASG 131 - Therapeutic Massage I

This course provides information on the theory and practice of therapeutic massage. Swedish massage techniques with variations are developed into a sequence for a full body therapeutic massage for healthy adults. Topics include basic anatomy and physiology of major muscle groups and bones, massage benefits and contraindications, professional ethics, body mechanics, and self-care. (F,Sp)

Prerequisite: Minimum 2.5 in BIOL 145 or concurrently and Evidence of HS Graduation or GED and Reading Level 5 and Writing Level 6 and Department Approval

MASG 136 - Medical Elements of Massage

This course will introduce the student to pathology of body systems and will address the positive or negative impact that massage therapy may have on those conditions. The student will also learn some basic medical vocabulary words to correspond with each body system. (F,Sp)

Prerequisite: Minimum 2.5 in MASG 131 or concurrently

MASG 138 - Fundamentals/Clinical Massage

This course prepares students to interact with massage clients as well as with allied health professionals. Active listening, rapport, empathy, and feedback skills used in a therapeutic massage environment will be taught. Students will develop an understanding of the physiological and emotional effects of touch and will learn protocol for establishing professional boundaries. (F,Sp)

Prerequisite: Minimum 2.5 in MASG 131 or concurrently and Reading Level 5 and Writing Level 6

MASG 141 - Massage Clinic I

Students will progressively utilize the knowledge, skills, and practical experience attained throughout the Therapeutic Massage Program in a clinical setting. The student will be engaged in weekly scheduled massage sessions with clients in this first of three clinical courses. (F,Sp,Su)

Prerequisite: Minimum 2.5 in (MASG 136 and BIOL 145) and (minimum 2.5 in (MASG 138 and MASG 151A and MASG 151B) or concurrently)

MASG 151 - Applied Massage Techniques

This course will introduce the student to various massage therapy techniques and how these techniques relate to individuals with specific needs. The focus will be on designing and implementing appropriate massage therapy techniques for chair massage, infants, pregnant women, athletes, chronic and terminally ill individuals, the elderly, and clients with psychological issues. (F,Sp)

Prerequisite: Minimum 2.5 in MASG 131 or concurrently

MASG 151A - Chair Massage

This course will introduce the student to chair massage techniques. Student will learn palpation skills and identification of bony landmarks and muscles. Use of body mechanics to reduce strain on the therapist is emphasized. (Sp)

Prerequisite: Minimum 2.5 in MASG 131

MASG 151B - Sports Massage

This course prepares the student to perform massage prior to and following an athletic event or training session. Thermal injuries, the use of ice and heat to supplement the healing effects of massage, cross fiber friction techniques, indications, contraindications and procedures are covered. (Sp)

MASG 151C - Maternal/Infant Massage

MASG 151D - Special Populations

Students learn to adapt massage techniques to the needs of special populations. The focus will be on designing and implementing appropriate massage therapy techniques for the chronic and terminally ill, the elderly, and clients with psychological and emotional issues. (F,Sp)

MASG 231 - Therapeutic Massage II

This course will introduce the student to clinical massage techniques to treat conditions of the upper body. Students will learn anatomy, physiology, and kinesiology of specific muscles of the head, neck, upper extremities, and torso followed by clinical massage techniques and stretches to treat these areas. (F,Sp)

Prerequisite: Minimum 2.5 in MASG 131

PROGRAM INFORMATION/REQUIREMENTS

1. It is advised that students achieve a Reading Level 5 and Writing Level 6 in order to be successful in therapeutic massage courses. International students must complete ESL Placement Tests.
2. Students can begin the program by enrolling for courses on a first come-first serve system basis.
3. Students are **required** to attend the student orientation held during the first class meeting of MASG 131. At the orientation students are responsible for
 - A. completing the Student Information Form, and;
 - B. providing verification/supporting documentation as proof that they are 18 years of age or older. (**Bring a copy** of your current Driver's License, or birth certificate) Students cannot attend classes without documentation. You will be considered absent until documentation is provided
4. All Therapeutic Massage students will be required to complete, and pass with 80%, a required on-line OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) Blood-Borne Pathogen and Universal Precautions training program when enrolling in MASG 131-Therapeutic Massage I. Students will be required to update the training yearly after July 1st. You cannot attend the second class of MASG 131 unless you pass this test and you will be considered absent.
5. All hands-on massage courses have a lecture and lab component to each class. Students are required to participate in each class by both giving and receiving massage with another student. Failure to do so will be considered "nonparticipation" and the student may be administratively withdrawn from the class under the College's W Grade Policy, which can be found at:

STUDENT LEARNING STYLES

The therapeutic massage program strives to present course information in a variety of ways to accommodate the different learning styles of the students. Everyone has a primary learning style that is visual, auditory or kinesthetic. Please make note of your primary learning style so that you can achieve success in the program.

Visual learners are people who primarily process information by what they see. Examples of course material that would enhance the learning process for visual learners are handouts, visual aids such as a skeleton and muscle models, watching demonstrations, and media presentations.

Auditory learners process information by what they hear. They understand best when spoken to as in a traditional classroom lecture or an instructor talking a student through hands on massage techniques.

Kinesthetic learners prefer hands on activities. A large percentage of students in massage education are kinesthetic learners. Kinesthetic learners understand best by palpation of bones, bony landmarks, and muscles as part of the learning process. All the massage technique courses have a lab component to learn and practice palpatory skills (see #5 above).

Learning disabilities affect students in different ways. Students may have difficulty remembering, understanding and/or expressing information. Students may be weak in spelling, writing math, reading, and problem solving, organization and time management. If a student feels they cannot meet the following guidelines and feel they have a learning disability they may contact the Office of Disability Support Services at (517) 483-1904 or 1207, or online at <http://www.lcc.edu/odss> to receive an appropriate accommodation.

MOTOR, COGNITIVE, and PSYCHOLOGICAL SKILLS ESSENTIAL FOR MASSAGE STUDENTS

1. Essential motor skills required to meet the class and clinical practice outcomes are:

Strength/Endurance: Perform physical activities requiring ability to push / pull and position the human body, up to 50 pounds. Possess the hand/arm strength necessary to manipulate muscles and other soft tissues.

Manual Dexterity: Have no impairment of the use of the hands, wrists, fingers, shoulders, or arms, which may interfere with the ability to manipulate the soft tissues of the human body.

Hearing: Ability to hear and comprehend the spoken word and normal sounds.

Tactile Ability: Demonstrate tactile abilities sufficient to make physical assessments of soft and hard tissues (palpation, physical assessment, and functions related to therapeutic intervention).

Mobility: Perform walking and long periods of standing.

2. Essential cognitive skills required to meet the class and clinical practice outcomes:

Attention Span: Attend to tasks/functions that require the ability to focus up to 60 minute. No mental, nervous, organic, functional disease or psychiatric disorder likely to interfere with the ability to coordinate treatment planning or work with health care professionals or the public. Possess the ability to establish and understand physical and emotional boundaries in the client/therapist relationship.

Conceptualization: Understand and relate to specific ideas, concepts, and theories generated and simultaneously discussed and implemented. Apply theory to clinical situations.

Memory: Remember tasks / assignments given to self and others over both long and short periods of time.

Critical Thinking: Possess critical thinking ability sufficient for clinical judgment. Ability to identify cause-effect relationships in clinical situations and develop and implement treatment plans.

3. Essential psychological skills required to meet the class and clinical practice outcomes:

Interpersonal: Demonstrate interpersonal skills to interact with individuals and groups from different social, emotional, cultural, and intellectual backgrounds. Establish rapport with clients in a therapeutic setting and with other colleagues.

Communication: Possess the ability to communicate sufficiently for interaction with others in both verbal and written form. Explain treatment procedures, initiate health teaching, document, interpret recommendations from health care professionals and understand verbal feedback from the massage client.

Substance Abuse: No current clinical diagnosis of alcoholism. Must not use Schedule 1 drugs or other substances such as amphetamines, narcotics, or any other habit-forming drug except those substances or drugs prescribed by a licensed medical practitioner who is familiar with the individual's medical history and assigned duties, and who can attest that the substance or drug will not adversely affect the individual's ability to safely practice in the health care setting.

PREGNANCY POLICY

If a student is currently pregnant, or becomes pregnant at any time while enrolled in the Therapeutic Massage Program, she must inform the Program Administrator in writing immediately. The Program Administrator will provide the student a copy of the Therapeutic Massage Program Pregnancy Guidelines. It is the pregnant student's responsibility to see that the guidelines are followed in the classroom, lab, and community service settings during the course of her pregnancy. A physician's written release will be required for the student to participate in either giving or receiving a massage in class or during community service events.

TRANSFER OF CREDIT

Only official transcripts will be evaluated for transfer credit. Lansing Community College will determine the credit value of each of the courses. The College will accept as official transcripts only incoming transcripts that have appropriate signatures and/or official college seals and that are mailed directly to the Lansing Community College Enrollment Services from an issuing institution. Transcripts or copies of transcripts carried by individuals may be used for academic advising or counseling, but transfer credits will NOT be posted to the Lansing Community College academic record from transcripts that are not received directly from the issuing institution. It is the function of the Enrollment Services Office of the College to verify the official status of all incoming transcripts prior to the evaluation and posting of transfer credit. All transcripts submitted to LCC for evaluation become the property of LCC. Students will receive official notification of transcript evaluation results upon completion of the process.

Course work which is similar in nature, content, and level to that offered by Lansing Community College will be accepted in transfer. Transfer credit will be accepted at full value in transfer if earned:

1. In a program, college, or university which offers programs that are comparable to programs offered by Lansing Community College, and the program or institution is either accredited or a candidate for accreditation by an accrediting association which is a member of Council for Higher Education Accreditation (CHEA), or
2. From institutions with professional accreditation but lacking regional accreditation, with attainment of a final grade of 2.0 or higher, providing an evaluation has been completed by appropriate program officials at Lansing Community College.
3. The massage program has an articulation agreement with Sienna Heights University. Students can apply all of the therapeutic massage credits towards a bachelor degree in applied science. You can contact Sienna Heights University at the LCC University Center at 483-9726.

ACADEMIC STANDING POLICY

The College and the Therapeutic Massage Program recognizes the need for students to maintain a minimum level of academic competency to prove academic success in a course as well as build proficiency in a field of study.

Students must maintain a course grade of at least a 2.5 in the Therapeutic Massage Program courses to remain in Good Standing, which indicates satisfactory academic progress. Students whose course scores fall below a 2.5 at mid-semester will be placed on “Probationary” standing by the course instructor, which indicates unsatisfactory academic progress. Students can return to Good Standing by earning a 2.5 or higher by the end of the semester.

Students receiving financial aid or veterans benefits are required to satisfy specific additional academic standards to continue receiving financial assistance. See the *Financial Aid* section of the LCC Catalog (page 10)

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Upon successful completion of all required classes in the Therapeutic Massage Program with a 2.5 or higher program GPA, the student will earn a Certificate of Achievement. The certificate of achievement consists of a minimum of 30 specifically designated semester credits in occupational areas. At least 10 semester credits must be earned in attendance at Lansing Community College.

Certificates of achievement and certificates of completion are groups of designated courses or a designated course in occupational areas. To receive a certificate of achievement or certificate of completion from Lansing Community College, a student must meet the following institutional graduation requirements:

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

A course grade of 2.5 or higher is required in Therapeutic Massage Program courses and prerequisites.

A grade of less than 2.5 (76%) or lower in any massage course will require that the student repeat the course.

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

Academic dishonesty of any kind will not be tolerated in this class. If you are caught cheating or plagiarizing, you will receive "0" (or "F" whichever you prefer) for the assignment. In addition, since academic dishonesty is a violation of the Student Code of Conduct, anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will be reported to The Office of Student Compliance.

PROGRAM POLICIES

Tardy and Attendance Policies:

Phone Usage:

Cell phones and texting are considered disruptive to the instructional process. Cell phone and/or the use of camera equipment is strictly prohibited in any massage course. Failure to abide by this provision may result in an administrative withdrawal.

Use of cell phones or cameras of any type while at the clinical site is prohibited and use of any pictures obtained at the clinical site on any type of social media (Facebook, MySpace, Twitter) is expressly forbidden.

Incomplete Grades:

Incomplete grades are not possible for the four week courses. If a student misses a session in a four week course they fail the course according to the program attendance policy. Students can provide documentation of the absence to the registrar and request tuition reimbursement and withdrawal from the course.

Make-Up Work:

It is the student's responsibility to check the course syllabus, obtain notes from another student, and approach the instructor to inquire about any make-up work if s/he has been absent from a class. If the student is absent on the day of a scheduled quiz, test or exam, s/he must contact the course instructor on the day of the quiz, test, or exam (please refer to your section syllabi for specific instructor contact information).

Make up opportunities for practical (hands-on) exams may be impossible to schedule, and it is highly recommended that the student be present and arrive on time for such exams. Failure to show for a scheduled practical exam may result in forfeiture of the practical exam score for that course.

Illness, Injury, Pregnancy:

- 1) It is the student's responsibility to inform the Therapeutic Massage Academic Team Leader of any serious illness, injury, surgery that might compromise their performance and the safety of either the student or their classroom partners, lab clients, or to the public when performing community service activities. It is the student's responsibility to report any further changes in their health status to the program coordinator. Reasonable accommodation will be our goal.
- 2) If a student is currently pregnant, or becomes pregnant at any time while enrolled in the Therapeutic Massage Program, she must inform the Therapeutic Massage Academic Team Leader in writing immediately. The Academic Team Leader will provide the student a copy of the Therapeutic Massage Program Pregnancy Guidelines. It is the pregnant student's responsibility to see that the guidelines are followed in the classroom, lab, and community service settings during the course of her pregnancy. A physician's written release will be required for the student to participate in either giving or receiving massage therapy in class or in community service events.
- 3) Any student having a serious illness, injury, surgery, or pregnancy while in the program will be required to obtain a physician's written release. This release must verify that s/he is able to meet the physical guidelines and practice requirements in the classroom, lab or during community service without any restrictions in activity. The goal is to prevent aggravating an existing condition or jeopardizing the safety and well-being of massage clients, classmates, or the public. The student will not be permitted to return to class without this written release, which will be maintained in the student's file.

Program Professionalism / Conduct:

Classroom Guidelines – Each of us enters this program with our own style, our own understanding of touch and our own goals. In order to learn and work in a manner that supports the education and growth of each individual, certain guidelines need to be established to provide a semblance of order for the group. The following will help you to learn in our environment.

- a) You are not expected to fully understand or master the material in class the first time it is presented. That is why there are homework assignments and study activities.

- b) You are expected to be an active participant in all class discussions.
- c) Lab time is designed to practice techniques from class in a supervised setting. Please practice only those applications specified by your instructor. If you are to work independently of others, please do so.
- d) Your instructor will provide specific guidelines and time frames for practicing techniques in the lab. These are to be followed in order to keep pace with the material presented. In all cases, you will need to practice both the techniques and its timely application outside of class.
- e) Please be considerate of your classmates and your instructors, and to the property of others. Act professionally at all times.
- f) Due to the hands-on nature of this profession, students must be a willing participant while either working on classmates and clients, or being worked on by fellow students.
- g) Feedback is a required component of the program. There is no sleeping in class, even with receiving a massage, as your feedback is necessary to help your classmates.
- h) With feedback, it is possible to be kind and honest in the same sentence. Polish that skill.
- i) The use of picture phones is strictly prohibited in the massage setting, and can be grounds for immediate dismissal. For everyone's privacy, please leave your cell phones elsewhere, or be sure it is turned off while in the classroom.
- j) As students you will also be acting as clients in the classroom, therefore there will be sharing of personal information that is pertinent to bodywork. Please treat one another with the same confidentiality and respect as you would be expected to when working in the field.
- k) **No food or drinks are allowed in the classroom. Water is allowed only in a closed container.**

Code of Ethics

The students of the LCC Therapeutic Massage Program are expected to follow standards of acceptable, ethical, professional behavior for massage therapists. The statements below reflect the spirit of the AMTA (American Massage Therapy Association) Code of Ethics and shall be the basis and standard of professionalism and conduct for the therapeutic massage student.

The massage student shall:

- 1) demonstrate commitment to provide the highest quality massage therapy/bodywork to those who seek their professional service.
- 2) acknowledge the inherent worth and individuality of each person by not discriminating or behaving in any prejudicial manner with clients and/or colleagues.
- 3) demonstrate professional excellence through regular self-assessment of strengths, limitations, and effectiveness by continued education and training.
- 4) acknowledge the confidential nature of the professional relationship with clients and respect each client's right to privacy.
- 5) conduct all business and professional activities within their scope of practice, the law of the land, and project a professional image.
- 6) refrain from engaging in any sexual conduct or sexual activities involving their clients.
- 7) accept responsibility to do no harm to the physical, mental and emotional well-being of self, clients, and associates.

Sexual Harassment, Inappropriate Behaviors and Touch:

Title 29 of the Code of Federal Regulations defines sexual harassment as:

- unwelcome sexual advances
- unwelcome requests for sexual favors
- other behavior of a sexual nature

Sexual harassment is unwanted, objectionable and disrespectful conduct and/or communication of a sexual nature. In the education setting, it applies to interaction between students, faculty, clinical supervisors, and clients. It also includes any behavior or conduct that interferes with a person's academic performance or creates an offensive or intimidating educational environment, whether directed at that person or another. All students are entitled to an educational experience in which words, actions and touch do not have any appearance of disrespect. Behaviors, relationships or activities of a sexual nature are never appropriate in a professional massage setting or classroom. We have zero tolerance for sexual harassment.

Draping Policy

- 1) Clients and students wear underwear.
- 2) Chest massage: Nipples and areoles must be covered and without contact from the therapist/student.
- 3) Abdominal draping from the xyphoid process to the superior boarder of the pubic bone. Open from these landmarks allowing access to the abdomen.
- 4) Gluteal massage: Students are required to move their underwear to expose the gluteal muscles in class. Students should wear underwear that allows full exposure of gluteus maximus i.e. thongs or loose briefs. The gluteal cleft and perineum is covered at all times.
- 5) In the clinic, student/therapist can ask, but client must move their own underwear for gluteal work.
- 6) There is no working under the sheet.
- 7) Faculty can drape accordingly as long as they follow the guidelines.

Dual Relationships:

Dual relationships are defined as those entered into outside of the classroom. Dual relationships occur when:

- 1) A student and teacher enter into a friendship or social relationship outside of the classroom.
- 2) A student enters into a friendship or social relationship with a massage client (recognizing that family and current friends provide good practice opportunities for the student).
- 3) A student enters into a dating or sexual relationship with another student or massage client.

In order to avoid the negative consequences of dual relationships (hurt feelings, confusion about educational/professional boundaries, favoritism, vulnerability, confidentiality, etc.), these relationships are discouraged.

Leaves of Absence:

Following college policy students have up to five years to complete the Therapeutic Massage Program once they enroll in MASG 131, Therapeutic Massage I. Students do not need to take courses every semester to obtain their Certificate of Achievement, therefore a formal request for a Leave of Absence is not required.

Termination (Suspension and Dismissals):

Following college policy as listed in the current LCC Catalog, suspension, dismissal and permanent dismissal from LCC may be imposed in cases of noncompliance with College rules and regulations, or violation of the Student Code of Conduct.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

In order to be successful learners, students must assume an active role in the learning process. The student responsibilities listed below emphasize behaviors that contribute directly to student academic success, and they apply to all students enrolled at the College.

1. Students will take responsibility for their own learning and for succeeding in their courses by:
 - a. Following course requirements as presented in course syllabi;
 - b. Attending all of their classes;
 - c. Preparing for classes and completing assignments on time;
 - d. Obtaining work missed in the case of an absence;
 - e. Cooperating with their instructor and other students to create a positive learning atmosphere;
 - f. Contributing effectively to class activities.
2. Students will be academically and intellectually honest in all classes, examinations, and learning activities. (The College, by regulation, will discipline students who cheat and/or copy the work of others; dishonesty is a serious offense and will be dealt with appropriately.)
3. Students will contribute to a positive learning environment by conducting themselves appropriately. (The College prohibits acts that interfere with the rights of others to seriously pursue an education. For more details on the regulations of the College, see section entitled Student Rights, Responsibilities, and Conduct.)

DRESS CODE

In addition to information contained in the 2007-2009 LCC Catalog (page 30), the following guidelines apply to appropriate student dress for the Therapeutic Massage Program:

- Personal hygiene - students are to be clean, well-groomed, and free of offensive body odors.
- Perfume – due to the close physical contact necessary during massage therapy practice, it is advised that you omit the use of perfume and aromatic lotions when attending massage therapy classes, labs, and community service events as a courtesy to those who have environmental sensitivities and allergies.
- Polo shirts with ankle length pants (Dockers style, black or tan) or hospital-type scrubs in the classroom. Either sandals or shoes are OK, but you must wear socks. For any clinic, or community services activity, you must wear the LCC Therapeutic Massage Program polo shirt and tan ankle length pants (see page 8 for purchasing information), and closed toed shoes.
- Nails should be kept short and filed smooth. When looking at the palm of your hand you should not be able to see the nails at the fingertips. Long nails in the classroom constitute a tardy or absence, depending on the length of class time it takes the student to meet the standard.
- No jewelry/watches to be worn on arms and hands while performing massage. These standards are set up for your safety and the safety of classmates and clients.
- Hair should be pulled back from the face.

Each student learning station in the massage room is equipped with curtains for privacy during labs, clinic or changing clothing while participating in class. Each table has one bolster and an adjustable face cradle. Body Cushions and other bolstering devices are available for student use in the labs. A state-of-the art sound system provides soothing music during lab classes. There are 12 professional massage chairs, 12 desktop portals, and 12 portable massage tables available for student use during classes and LCC sponsored community service events. **NO FOOD OR DRINKS ARE ALLOWED IN THE CLASSROOM. WATER IS ALLOWED ONLY IN A CLOSED CONTAINER.**

INSURANCE

ARTICULATION AGREEMENT

The Therapeutic Massage Program has an articulation agreement with Siena Heights University. All the credits earned for the Certificate of Achievement from LCC are applied towards a Bachelor of Applied Science in Therapeutic Massage. The massage program is 37.75 credit hours. Siena Heights University requires 90 transfer credits. Students need to contact Siena Heights University staff to determine additional transfer credits.

Students then complete an additional 30 credits from Siena Heights for the bachelor degree. All Siena Heights University credits can be completed in Lansing or on-line. To obtain the bachelor degree students must also have two years experience in the practice of massage and be certified.

STATE REQUIREMENTS

NATIONAL CERTIFICATION

Successful completion of this program prepares an individual for national certification. There are two national exams for massage therapists. The two tests are: NCETM (National Certification Exam for Therapeutic Massage) offered through the National Certification Board for Therapeutic Massage and Bodywork (NCBTMB), or MBLEx (Massage and Bodywork Licensing Examination) offered through the Federation of State Massage Therapy Boards (FSMTB).

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INCIDENT / ACCIDENT PROTOCOL

In the event that a student is involved in an incident or accident while in class or lab, such as exposure to a blood borne pathogen or other biohazard, the student must notify the instructor of the class immediately, and the instructor will contact the Department of Public Safety for further guidance.

Students are required to take an on-line course in blood borne pathogens by the second week of their first massage therapy class, and s/he must update that training during the month of July each year they are in the program.

STUDENT APPEALS AND COMPLAINT PROCEDURE

Before initiating the formal appeal process at the divisional level, students are encouraged to first meet with the initial decision-maker involved (the instructor, for example) to attempt to resolve issues in an informal manner. When a student wishes to lodge a formal complaint regarding a person—except in cases of sexual harassment/discrimination (which is found in the LCC Catalog –page 30-under *Student and Staff Sexual Harassment and Discrimination*, or at: http://www.lcc.edu/eo/sexual_harassment/)—the student is encouraged to use the following line of appeal:

- a. Instructor
- b. Program director
- c. Department chair
- d. The dean of the division involved (or his or her designee)
- e. The Judicial Board of the College
- f. The President (or his or her designee)

Note: At each level of the complaint process, a student will have up to 10 (ten) calendar days (excluding Saturday and Sunday) to appeal a decision after notification of that decision at a prior level.

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
