### **When the Diagnosis is Personality Disorder: Creating Individualized Approaches to Accommodate Older Adults who are Viewed as “Difficult”**

Mental health clinicians often encounter older adults who have personality traits and life-long patterns of coping that contribute to conflict in relationships when the individual needs assistance from others. This session will present a model in which personality traits can be viewed as being on a continuum and recognized as fluid, rather than fixed, between styles and disorders. The presentation will begin with an overview of concepts, diagnostic criteria, and frequently-occurring challenges. The presentation will emphasize how the model can inform interventions, and help direct care providers modify their approaches to better suit these “challenging” individuals. Participants are expected to be familiar with DSM-IV-TR.

### **Psychosis in Late life**

Psychosis in older adults is a heterogeneous condition with diverse etiologies and presentations. Accurate diagnosis requires clinicians to utilize a bio-psychosocial framework for assessment. Dr. Keller will review the various causes of late-life psychosis and discuss how to accurately assess individuals displaying symptoms of psychosis. She will also review treatment options, including pharmacological, behavioral, and educational interventions for individuals with psychosis and their care providers.

#### **Interventions for Depression in Late Life**

Late-life depression can be addressed and treated effectively. This intensive will focus on how to use behavioral treatment strategies for older adults with depression. Participants will learn about the basic model of behavioral and cognitive-behavioral therapies and how to implement these approaches with older adults. The presenter will lay out clear guidelines for a brief assessment of depression and discuss behavioral treatments for effectively treating depression, including relaxation, mood monitoring and increasing pleasant events, and bibliotherapy.

#### **The Diagnostic Dilemma: Is It a Medical or Psychiatric Condition?**

Clinicians who assess older adults may be faced with the challenge of determining whether an individual's symptoms are caused by a psychiatric disorder or a medical condition. In some situations, it can be very difficult to determine when the symptoms suggest that an Axis I diagnosis should be given, particularly if the person has a history of persistent mental illness and/or is residing in a nursing home. Participants will learn to recognize when symptoms are more suggestive of a delirium, dementia, depression, or other neuropsychiatric conditions. This **intermediate to advanced session** is targeted to social workers, counselors, RN's, psychologists, physicians and others who are responsible for sorting out the relationship between a medical illness and a psychiatric disorder. Case examples will be used to illustrate the lecture material.

### A – 1

#### How to Build a Coalition on Mental Health and Aging

In-home respite provides companionship and mental stimulation for individuals with Alzheimer's disease or a related dementia, but also offers relief to the caregivers. Topics will include the admission criteria and process of in-home services, the assessment tools used to provide person-centered care, and volunteer/staff recruitment and development.

**OBRA 101**

New OBRA evaluators and service workers will receive an introduction to OBRA and the PASRR process. This workshop will focus on the fundamentals of PASRR, including the Level II evaluation, placement options, and recommendations for mental health services.

**Understanding Culture and Race in Working with Older Adults**

This workshop will outline the challenges of providing culturally competent and racially responsive mental health services to older adults. Participants will learn whether there are answers to the question: if an individual is unable to participate in treatment decisions, who can make what decision when? The appropriateness and interrelationship among durable power of attorney, living will, do-not-resuscitate declaration, family consent, civil commitment, and guardianship will be discussed. The presentation will also cover provider mandates of the Federal Patient Self-Determination Act and the Michigan Dignified Death Act, the role of the probate court, and psychiatric advance directives

**Pain Management  
in Long-Term Care:  
Palliative vs Curative  
Approaches**

This presentation is based on the Clinical Practice Guidelines for Acute Pain Management and Clinical Practice Guidelines for Quality Palliative Care. Participants will learn how to assess pain accurately through the use of clinical tools and other strategies and how to identify appropriate pharmacologic and/or non-pharmacologic therapies to address pain. This session will also explore how to meet the psychosocial and spiritual needs of individuals experiencing pain, the impact of culture on the experience and treatment of pain, and the ethical and legal issues associated with pain management versus palliative care.

The Washtenaw County Hoarding Task Force formed as a multi-agency partnership of public and private agencies to raise public awareness of the problem and preserve safe and appropriate housing for individuals. This workshop will provide an overview of hoarding behaviors and best practices, as well as early intervention strategies. The session will also focus on the community impact of hoarding and the development of a coordinated community effort amongst social service agencies.
