Nursing, PN Option  
Certificate of Achievement

Curriculum Code: 0235 (Effective Fall 2016 – Fall 2017)

The Practical Nurse Program at Lansing Community College is approved by the Michigan Board of Nursing and utilizes the career ladder concept. The practical nurse program is offered in a 2-year Traditional or 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Accelerated sequence. There are specific prerequisites required for entry into the program. Building on these prerequisites, a student completing Level I and Level II receives a Certificate of Achievement and is eligible to take the national examination for Practical Nurse (PN) which is the National Council Licensing Examination–Practical Nurse (NCLEX–PN).

The Practical Nurse (PN) Program prepares an individual to, with supervision from the Registered Nurse, implement a plan of care for clients in a variety of healthcare settings often working in long-term care. The education and scope of practice of the PN is determined by state law. The student must successfully complete this certificate of achievement and the National Council Licensing Examination–Practical Nurse (NCLEX–PN) to practice as a practical nurse.

This is a selective admission program. In order to be considered as a candidate for this program, students must meet basic admission requirements beyond those required for admission to the college. Many of the courses for this program are open only to students officially admitted to the Nursing Program. This curriculum is Level I and Level II of the Registered Nurse Program.

#### PREREQUISITES

Students successfully completing prerequisites for admission to the Nursing Program will have a Reading Level 5, a Writing Level 8, and a Math Level 5.

### NOTES:

1. Current Basic Life Support Certification (BLS) is required throughout the program (NCHE 102 or NCHE 103 or American Heart Association/Health Care Provider or American Red Cross/Professional Rescuer).
2. NURS 200 may be taken up to two years prior to admission to the Nursing Program or concurrently with NURS 150 for students in the 2-year Track.
3. WRIT 121 may be replaced by WRIT 122, WRIT 131, WRIT 132, ENGL 122, or ENGL 132.
4. All NURS courses in this curriculum must be completed with a minimum grade of 3.0 and all other courses must be completed with a minimum grade of 2.5 or to earn the Certificate of Achievement.

### SUGGESTED COURSE SEQUENCE

#### Subchoice 1A: 2-year Traditional Track

Courses listed below as "Requirements for Admission" must be completed prior to admission to the Nursing Program. Although students are accepted to the program in late spring, they will be assigned to begin Semester I in either fall or spring semester. A student may not begin a new semester until she or he has successfully completed all of the NURS courses listed in a previous sequenced semester with a minimum grade of 3.0. Some courses may be completed before the designated semester, typically non-nursing courses. NURS 200 is the only NURS-prefix course in the 2-year Track that is offered summer semester.

### Subchoice 1C: 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Accelerated Track

Students holding a bachelor's degree must have met or completed the Requirements for Admission listed below prior to the first semester of the Nursing Program. The 2<sup>nd</sup> Degree Accelerated Track requires that PN NURS courses be taken over Fall and Spring semesters and includes online methodology and face-to-face instruction. A student may not begin a new semester until she or he has successfully completed all of the NURS courses listed in the previous sequenced semester with a minimum grade of 3.0.
