



Transfer Credit

My waiver form was processed, and I was able to register, but I don't see any transfer credit on my LCC record - why?

Remember that the waiver process is simply a streamlined path for receiving placement levels and prerequisite overrides so that you can register for courses. If you want credits transferred to LCC, the process is much different.

If your school is in the United States, you will need to have them send an official transcript through the U.S. Mail directly from their Registrar's Office to ours: _

If your school is outside the United States, you will need to contact one of the National Association of Credential Evaluation Services, Inc. credential evaluation services (www.naces.org) and request a course-specific evaluation as explained here: _

In any event, for the purposes of credit transfer, such transcripts can never come through the student, regardless of whether the transcripts are sealed or not.

Whereas the waiver process may take a matter of days, official credit transfer could take six to twelve weeks.

If I received a certain waiver (Reading Level 5+Writing Level 8, override to take PSYC205, etc.), does this mean that if my school sends an official transcript through the U.S. Mail to LCC's Registrar's Office, I will receive transfer credit (for WRIT121, PSYC200, etc.)?

Not necessarily. Only Registrar's Office decides on transfer credit, so receiving a waiver does not imply any guarantee about whether classes will transfer.

I have heard that "Math credit is only 'good' for two years" - is that true?



No. Although a *Math Level* is good for only two years for the purpose of taking MATH 112 or higher, math *credit* does not expire. Please see FAQ# 15 above.

In addition, remember that if you request your previous school to send the official transcript to LCC's Registrar's Office, once that appropriate credit transfers, our Banner software then reads that credit as the necessary prerequisite, even if you do not have a Math Level per se. For example, if you receive credit for STAT 170, you will be able to register for a non-MATH class needing Math Level 5 or lower; transfer credit for MATH 112 would allow you to register for a non-MATH class needing Math Level 6 or lower; transfer credit for MATH 151 would allow you to register for a non-MATH class needing Math Level 9 or lower; etc.
