Calvin Jones Named 2011 Lansing Community College Distinguished Alumnus

A native to Lansing, Michigan, Jones attended Eastern High School and continued his education at Lansing Community College, earning an Associate Degree. Jones served in the US Marine Corps working in Administration/ Communication and was honorably discharged in 1976. Continuing to educate himself, Jones graduated from the Community Leadership and Development Academy at LCC in 1990, the Michigan Political Leadership Program at Michigan State University in 1996, the Excellence in Nonprofit Leadership and Management Program at MSU in 1999 and the Leadership Michigan/Michigan Chamber of Commerce in 2005.

His career of 34 years at the Lansing Board of Water & Light, began in 1977, where he has invested talent, time, and experience, moving quickly from General Maintenance Laborer to Advanced Laborer, Construction Mechanic, Office Supervisor, General Supervisor, and Manager-Government Relations in 2007. This position has afforded him the opportunity to positively change the direction of his community through involvement in civic programs, policy regulation in nonprofit organizations, and serving as a liaison for the Lansing Board of Water & Light in partnerships and sponsorships with the City of Lansing and local corporations. He is also a member of the Lansing Economic Development Board, Tax Increment Authority and the Brownsfield Redevelopment Authority.
