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### Donuts with the Dean Events



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## Counselor Outreach Events in October

LCC Counselors held two student outreach events during October in efforts to connect with students regarding their mental health needs, responsible drinking and counseling services available to them.

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### Test your mood

The first event, Test Your Mood, was held October 19 at Downtown Campus. The article in The Lookout summarized it perfectly.

Lansing Community College counselors successfully put together another event that brought mental health awareness to campus.

The "Test Your Mood" event was held Wednesday, Oct. 19 in the Gannon Building's StarZone Highway. It was open to LCC students to bring any questions or concerns they may have had regarding mental health.

There were about 50 students who stopped by to check out the events, with three counselors on standby. There was a display of two tables that provided information about depression, free counseling and mental health issues,

as well as free goodies such as mood rings, keychains and reusable cups.

Every October, which is Depression Awareness Month, LCC's counseling team puts together a mood event for the stigma of depression, while also acknowledging domestic violence and Relationship Awareness Month, according to LCC Counselor Louise Rabidou.

"We host the events to educate the campus community about mood disorders including depression, anxiety, post-traumatic stress disorder, seasonal affective disorder and to help the campus be aware of the services we provide," Rabidou explained.

"We have free confidential short-term counseling for any concerns that students may have."

Rabidou said she would like to increase

the awareness of the counseling services, but also help break down the stigma that surrounds depression and anxiety. She offered words of encouragement to those who may be struggling with mental health.

“Know that you are not alone and there is help and support available,” Rabidoux said. “When people deal with depression or mood disorders they tend to isolate or feel alone. Connection can be a really important piece when coping with mental-health issues.”

LCC student William DeKoninck said he believes the event was helpful for students who are dealing with depression, anxiety or other mood disorders.

“I would like to see more events on campus that bring awareness to mental health,” DeKoninck said. “I think it is important that we continue to spread awareness and offer support to people dealing with any mental health issues.”

### Think Transfer

In October, the ASCs held two events about transferring to 4-year colleges/universities. “Think Transfer, Part 1” was held on Oct. 12 and “Think Transfer, Part 2” was held on Oct. 26. Nine students came to Part 1, which focused on getting started thinking about where to transfer, and what to look for. Seventeen students came to Part 2, in which they discussed more specifically how to apply and the steps involved in transferring.

Activities throughout the week placed university admissions representatives in



front of students. Monday and Tuesday, our University Center partners (Central, Northwood, Siena Heights and University of Michigan-Flint), occupied tables in the busy thoroughfare of the Gannon Building. Wednesday was dedicated to Envision Green for students looking to transfer to MSU. Several Michigan State University admissions staff members and Provost Dr. Teresa Woodruff, along with Associate Provost Dr. Mark Largent, were on hand to express their interest in seeing LCC students persevere. The week was rounded out with a brunch on Thursday, providing students time to mingle with representatives



from the University Center, and Friday was dedicated to social media with the chance to win LCC swag. The idea was to make the week as engaging as possible, and be "on-hand," to help students tackle the confusing path of transferring and moving on to not only another school, but a new experience. Approximately, sixty students attended our events and roughly 70 more received general information regarding services and transfer options. LCC students were encouraged to make connections with schools directly in the hopes of developing a one on one relationship that will sustain them throughout their educational pursuits.

## Top student welders take over SkillsUSA competitions in Atlanta

The SkillsUSA Championship is the centerpiece of the organization's annual National Leadership and Skills Conference (NLSC), a weeklong celebration of students in various trades. This year's edition, held in Atlanta, followed a canceled celebration in 2020 and a hybrid celebration in 2021.

More than 6,500 high school and college students competed in 108 different trade, technical and leadership competitions this year. **This included dozens of students and teams competing in three welding categories: welding, welding fabrication and welding sculpture.**

"You'll see things that are very representative of their lives," said Shanen Aranmor, welding sculpture judge and founder of Weld Like A Girl. "I'm sure there's a story behind each one."

In the welding category, students tested their skills and knowledge in multiple areas, including measuring weld replicas using weld measuring gauges, laying out a plate, using oxyacetylene equipment for cutting, gas metal arc welding (GMAW), flux-cored arc welding (FCAW), making welds in various positions, and using a combination machine capable of providing the correct welding current for shielded metal arc welding (SMAW) and gas tungsten arc welding (GTAW).

"Where is welding not seen? It's in the chair you're sitting in; the bed you were on probably had welded brackets, even if it's made from wood; your car has welds on it," said Jeff Seelye, an instructor for the Eaton Regional Education Service Agency high school welding program, based out of LCC. "It's everywhere."

The application, along with the dynamic form, have been updated so students get an automatic response and letter about the program, and are encouraged to schedule an intake appointment with the coordinator. Once the student is part of the ACCESS scholars program, they are added to the D2L course site, where they receive announcements and invitations to participate in events that help with retention and completion.

ACCESS has also been able to work collaboratively with the Learning Commons to provide tutorial support for students in the CCLC. Recruitment and outreach efforts are being made at the Downtown Campus and extension sites, along with collaborative efforts with our University Partners and community partners like Case Credit Union and MSU Federal Credit Union, to facilitate student success in our students' personal and professional lives.

Several lunch-and-learn activities are happening throughout the fall semester, ranging from financial literacy to internship opportunities to social media platforms in the job search. Students also have the chance to have professional photos taken for their LinkedIn profiles. Academic success coaches and academic advisors are scheduled to work with our ACCESS scholars to help with stress management, study skills and planning for course selections for spring semester. Librarians and career advisors are working collaboratively to provide support for our ACCESS scholars and assist with our lunch-and-learns. In addition, students continue to drop in to get assistance on a daily basis.
