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Purchasing Earns Excellence Award for 23rd Consecutive Year

LCC’s Purchasing Department has been awarded the prestigious 2025 Annual Achievement of Excellence in Procurement® (AEP) from the National Procurement Institute (NPI), marking LCC’s 23rd consecutive year earning this award. The AEP award is earned by agencies that demonstrate a commitment to procurement excellence by embracing innovation, professionalism, productivity, leadership and e-procurement.

The application is designed to encourage procurement professionals to go beyond the minimum requirements, as set yearly by the AEP sponsors, and to recognize innovative programs and solutions that exemplify outstanding achievements. The award not only focuses on practical, documented work but also recognizes leadership and contributions that further advance the public procurement profession.

In 2025, LCC was among 216 successful applicants, only 15 of which were in higher education. Great work, Purchasing!

The book tells the story of the Lemmon v New York, Case (popularly known as the Lemmon Slave Case). It details the issue of whether or not slaves stepping foot in a free state are, in fact free from their owner. The case was tried in 1852. In addition, descendants of The Eight have attended Lansing Community College and still reside in the area. They participated in this event as honored guests.

The UM-Health-Sparrow Mobile Health Clinic is staffed with medical providers and clinical support positions who offer a variety of services to visitors, including:

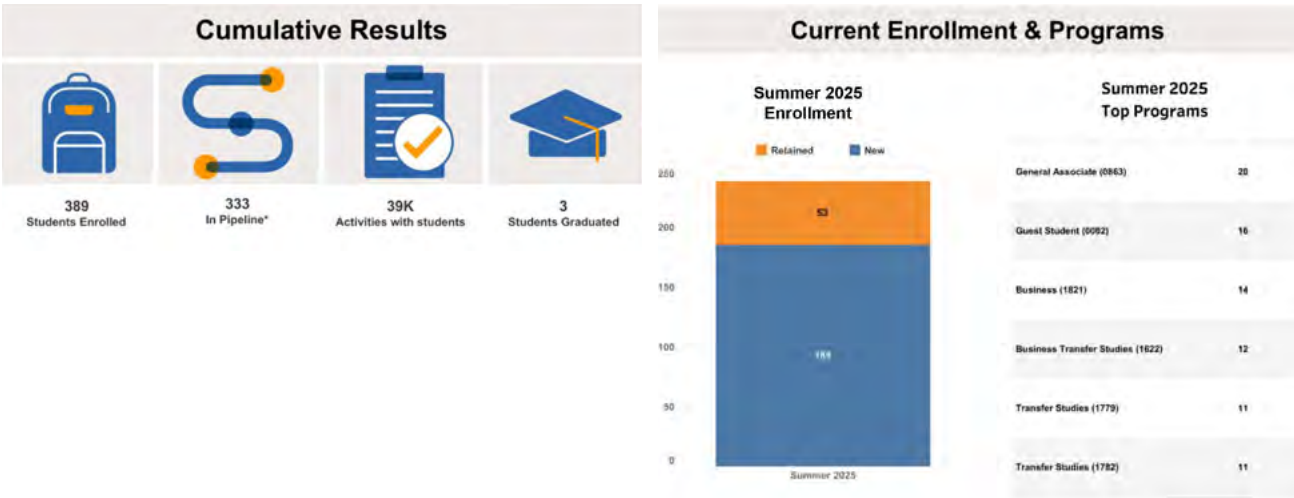

LCC HVAC Department Building Training and Assessment Center

Lansing Community College HVAC Department, in collaboration with MSU and Lansing School District, was successfully awarded a Department of Energy grant called the Building Training and Assessment Center (BTAC) in 2024. The grant officially kicked off in 2025. There are two main goals in the BTAC grant: 1. Train students on careers in clean energy. 2. Provide free energy assessments for small commercial building owners and K-12 schools in the Greater Lansing area. To date in 2025, we have trained 13 LCC students in the BTAC grant. The students and faculty have completed seven energy assessments around the Lansing area since the summer of 2025. At least one more assessment is scheduled for Fall 2025.

LCC Admissions and Technical Careers Division Participates in the Gear Up Event at the Lansing CenterAdult Enrichment

On September 18, 2025, Career and Technical Education Specialist Scott Nigoff, Admissions Counselor D’Quan Hursey, and Program Improvement/ Interim Advanced Manufacturing Program Director Nicole Reinhart-Huberty attended the University of Michigan Gear Up event at the Lansing Center. During the event, 2,000 high school seniors from across Michigan had the opportunity to be inspired by speakers, connect with college representatives, and apply for on-site admission.

Manufacturing Day Press Conference Hosted at LCC West Campus

Lansing Community College, in collaboration with Capital Area Manufacturing Council (CAMC), Technical Careers proudly kicked off **Manufacturing Day** with a press conference on October 2, 2025, in the Flex Lab, underscoring our leadership in workforce development and innovation.

The event featured remarks from LCC President Dr. Steve Robinson, Cindy Kangas (Executive Director, Capital Area Manufacturing Council), Fred Render (CAMC Board Member, Capital Steel & Wire), Professor Sid Mosley (Manufacturing Engineering Technology), Program Director Jonathan Gusmano, and Welding Technologies student Barbie Staley. A highlight of the event was a special demonstration by “SNOOP DOGG” — LCC’s quadruped drone platform (Security, Networking, and Operations Observation Platform Drone-Oriented Geospatial Guardian), which showcased how advanced

robotics and AI-driven tools are being integrated into the manufacturing field.

In addition to the press conference, West Campus welcomed students from Lansing Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) and Owosso Public Schools during Manufacturing Week. These students participated in hands-on learning experiences in the Machine Shop and Welding Lab, providing them with direct exposure to modern manufacturing technologies and career opportunities.

Manufacturing remains a vital part of Lansing’s economic foundation, and LCC continues to play a pivotal role in preparing the next generation of workers. Our programs emphasize not only foundational technical skills but also the integration of emerging technologies such as AI, automation, drones, and advanced robotics.

Browser-Based Apps Drive Student Success in Online Courses

Professor Tedd Sperling has developed custom browser-based applications to improve student success in fully online courses. The SQL Emulator eliminates barriers by allowing database students to practice coding without installing complex software, while Ask Sage, an integrated AI assistant, gives mobile app students real-time coding support and helps faculty identify learning challenges. Both tools remove obstacles, increase equity, and ensure students stay engaged and successful in their coursework.

LCC Instructor Publishes Firefighting Safety Guide in National Magazine

Kevin Neely, a faculty member at Lansing Community College, has published an article in Firehouse magazine on the critical skill of assessing roof safety during fire operations.

In "**The Firefighter's Art of Reading a Roof**," Neely addresses how modern lightweight construction materials can fail within minutes, making structural assessment more crucial than ever. He outlines a systematic approach that begins as firefighters approach a scene, evaluating roof pitch, covering materials, ventilation indicators and potential hazards like HVAC units or solar panels.

The article appears in Firehouse, a leading trade magazine serving fire and emergency services nationwide.



New collaboration with American Rheinmetall

Over the summer, the Technical Careers Apprenticeship team collaborated with **American Rheinmetall** to establish a U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) Registered Apprenticeship Program. American Rheinmetall, a rapidly growing company, expanded its operations in 2024 by acquiring the former Loc Performance facility. American Rheinmetall is a diversified full-service vehicle Original Equipment Manufacturer (OEM) and Tier 1 Supplier for the U.S. Military. American Rheinmetall delivers cutting edge vehicle systems, mechanical systems, intelligent systems for ground vehicles and IRS platforms, soldier lethality enhancements, short range air defense solutions, armored products, rubber solutions and track systems.

American Rheinmetall invited Apprenticeships Specialist’s Kelsey Lorichon and Wyn Wilson along with Lead Welding Instructor Scott Poe, and Lead Machining Instructor Todd Cotter to tour their facilities and collaboratively select courses for their apprenticeship program. As a result of this collaboration, two DOL-registered apprenticeship programs were successfully established for the occupations of Welder and Fabrication Welder. While American Rheinmetall continues the process of selecting its apprentices, we look forward to welcoming them once they begin.

We are thrilled for LCC to serve as the provider of their Related Technical Instruction (RTI) for these programs and are excited to continue building this valuable partnership with American Rheinmetall.

West Campus hosts its first Labs Open House

On Wednesday, August 13, Lansing Community College’s (LCC) West Campus hosted its first Labs Open House, an event designed to help students and their families become more familiar with our technical lab environments before the start of the semester. This unique initiative allowed participants to experience the sights, sounds, and sensations of our state-of-the-art labs while learning about the equipment, technology, and features that support student success. The open house featured guided experiences in the Precision Machining, Welding, Mechatronics, Automotive, Building Construction, Electrical, and HVAC labs, providing attendees with a well-rounded introduction to the diverse technical career opportunities available at LCC.

For students who have never been in a technical lab, the Labs Open House offered an invaluable opportunity to ease anxieties, build familiarity, and prepare for the learning experience ahead. By offering a supportive environment that highlights both the academic and practical aspects of technical education, LCC continues to demonstrate its commitment to accessibility, inclusion, and student success.

Summer post FAA inspection debrief

On June 27, Aviation Safety Inspectors from the East Michigan Flight Standards District Office (EMI FSDO) paid a visit to Lansing Community College, a 14 CFR Part 147 Aviation Maintenance Technician School, located at 661 Aviation Drive in Mason Michigan. The purpose of this visit was to perform routine surveillance following the FAA scheduled 4.0 Data Collection Tool (DCT) titles Technical Operations Inspection criteria.

The EMI FSDO Inspectors found the LCC staff and facilities to be operating at a high efficiency. It was also noted that the program managers are dedicated to following the 14 Code of Federal Regulations, to the safety of their students, and to the quality of the education LCC provides. Also noted was the professional nature at which this facility is operating and the promotion of an Aviation Safety Culture throughout.

The EMI FSDO Inspectors did not find any discrepancies during this routine surveillance inspection.

The Motorcycle Safety program ended September 13 for the 2025 season. The passing rate for students who participated in the courses was 78.8% for the Basic Rider Course (BRC) and 85.3% for the Intermediate Rider License Waiver (BRC2) Course. There is no pass/fail grade for the Advanced Rider Course (ARC), and both ARC classes had near full enrollment.

Student surveys were generally very positive. Based on student comments, the program has revised the information on the website to be more complete and more consistent among the three courses. The program will also try to make the registration process easier. All in all, 2025 was a great season that ran very smoothly.

BCI Trains Dean Transportation in First Aid, CPR, AED, and School Bus Health Care I, II, & III – Various Locations, MI.

The Business & Community Institute provided CPR and SBHC training to several hundred Dean Transportation School Bus Drivers throughout Michigan this summer. Training included Heartsaver® First Aid, CPR, and AED. Dean employees also received customized School Bus Health Care training to prepare them

with as many necessary skills as possible to prevent and/or respond to situations they may encounter with their riders.



The BCI Provides PLC Maintenance and Troubleshooting RS Logix 5000/Studio 5000 Training to Gestamp – Mason, MI

PLC Maintenance and Troubleshooting is a custom-designed course to develop the hands-on skills necessary to troubleshoot and replace Allen-Bradley 525 Drives. The participants learned uploading, downloading, re-configuring, and troubleshooting the 525 Drive and associated hardware/cabling. The entire class was focused on maintenance and how they interact with logic and hardware associated with variable frequency drives and motors found throughout any manufacturing facility.

The BCI Provides Siemens SIMATIC S7 and Communication Devices Training to Gestamp – Mason, MI

This training concentrated on STEP7 software, program structures, system functions, and custom block design. STEP7 engineering tools and programming instructions were demonstrated to guide the student to help understand realistic applications.

This course also provided an introduction to PROFIBUS and Net Pro. Participants learned SIMATIC Manager applications. Training also included an understanding of hardware configuration, device, station and interface configuration of a PROFIBUS network.

The BCI Provides Siemens S7 PLC TIA Portal Programming 1 Training to Gestamp – Mason, MI

Siemens S7 PLC TIA Portal Programming 1 is a practical custom designed course for an entry level machine tool electrician, supervisor, or controls technician that involves over 90% hands on training.



The BCI Provides ISO9001 Internal Auditor Training – Online

Internal Auditing for ISO9001 is an activity based workshop intended to develop the skills required to conduct effective quality management system audits to the ISO9001 standard. Recommended for new or current internal auditors who need to perform internal environmental audits, this course provides hands on practice learning, applying and auditing to the requirements of ISO9001.



The BCI provides Lansing Community College – VP Business Operations: True Colors

True Colors is a helpful and engaging workplace personality type information portal that helps colleagues gain a meaningful appreciation of each other's unique contributions to collaborative endeavors. By exploring how people react to real work situations encountered daily on the job, participants gain valuable insight into each other's workplace personality styles, leading to a happier, collaborative workplace.

The BCI provides Lansing Community College – Student Affairs Division: Leadership Training - Strength Finders.

This program was developed by Gallup as a means of surveying the working world of their talents, ambitions, dreams, challenges, and overall outlook on work. By discovering your own and your colleague's unique abilities, you will be able to build upon your strengths and the group strengths.

BCI Open Enrollment – Online: Court Electronic Operator (CEO) Exam Preparation Course 2025.

This online course helped participants gain the knowledge, skills, and abilities to become a court electronic operator as it relates to court reporting in the State of Michigan. Successful completion of this course will allow participants to sit for the certification examination to officially become a CEO and record courtroom proceedings, as well as the ability to produce a log.

Community Education and Workforce Development (CEWD)

LCC's CEWD and Technical Careers Divisions Take Part in MSU's Future of Work Initiative

On Wednesday, October 1, 2025, Aspen Scholar Rachel Lipson (Founding Director of the Harvard Project on Workforce) visited LCC's West Campus to tour the Center for Manufacturing Excellence and discuss LCC's approach to workforce development in the skilled trades. Rachel visited Lansing as a regional stop on her research journey to learn about our region's manufacturing industry. Rachel's

research efforts are part of the beginning stages of her new book and project, The New American Frontier. The book will draw on examples from domestic "frontier regions," Lansing being one of them, that have been early movers in the production of key technologies like AI data centers, semiconductors, quantum computing, clean energy, aerospace, biomanufacturing, and electric vehicles.

In addition to her visit to LCC's West Campus, Lee Gardner (Interim Dean, CEWD), Steve McNeil (Business Development Manager), and Jonathan Gusmano (Program Manager) attended an invite-only roundtable discussion with local economic development and educational leaders. 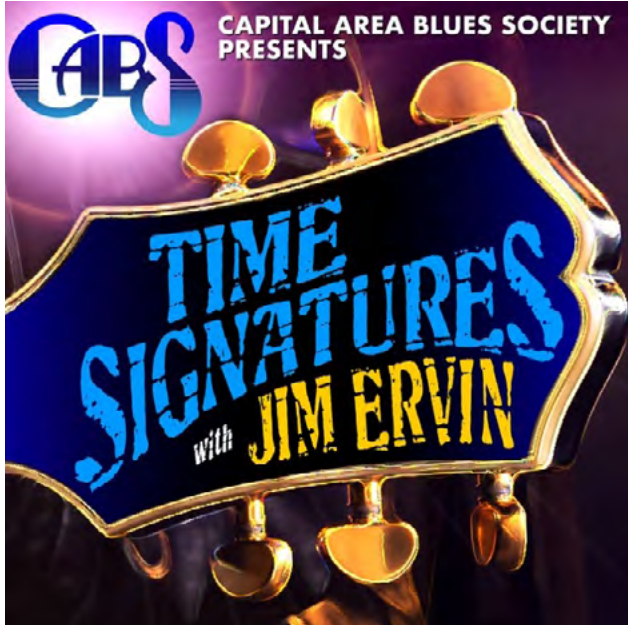
New student podcast

Social Media Analytics
for September 2025

Social Media Analytics Key

Total Posts

How many times a video, image, tweet, article, etc., was sent out on a given social media platform that month.

Follower +/-

How many users that decided to follow or unfollow a social media page in a given month for each platform.

Reach

A metric that refers to the number of users who have encountered a particular content on a social media platform.

Total Monthly Reach

This metric is estimated by each platform. It is a give-or-take of how many users in total viewed any content from a social media page that month. It shows roughly how big of a net is being cast.

Average Reach per Post

This is not an estimate like the “Total Monthly Reach” stat. This is calculated by taking the reach for each post that month and then dividing it by the total number of posts that month. It gives an idea of how many users, on average, came across a post from a given platform that month.

Engagements

Engagements are generally defined as when someone interacts with a post. What constitutes an engagement varies by platform. Examples of engagements include liking a post, commenting, sharing, saving, clicking on a link, clicking on an image, or re-sharing a post.

Total Engagements

The total sum of engagements for each post from each platform in a given month.

Average Engagements

‘Total Engagements’ divided by ‘Total Posts’ for each platform. Gives an idea of how many interactions from users/followers one could expect for an average post during the month for the specified platform.

Engagement Rate

Also referred to as Engagement Rate by Reach (ERR). This divides the ‘Average Engagements’ metric by the ‘Average Reach per Post’ metric. Essentially, this measures the percentage of users who chose to interact with a post after seeing it on the specified platform.
