Earth Matters on Stage

In March, Arts Outreach Coordinator Melissa Kaplan had the opportunity to participate on a panel at the Earth Matters on Stage Ecodrama Playwrights' Festival and Symposium. Held at The Ohio State University March 5-8, the panel discussed the use of Climate Change Theatre Action (CCTA) plays in the higher ed classroom. Panelists included faculty from Miami University of Ohio, Eckerd College (Florida) and Michigan State University, led by Chantal Bilodeau, artistic director of the global CCTA Festival. Having produced three CCTAs at LCC, Melissa was the sole community college representative on the panel and at the symposium. Founded in 2004, the Earth Matters on Stage symposium fosters dialogue and learning at the intersection of environment, culture and performance.

LCC Joins National Conversation on AI Through Faculty Fellow Program

The Faculty Fellow for Teaching with AI program is advancing AI literacy at local, national and international levels, positioning LCC as a recognized contributor to responsible AI integration in higher education.

LCC participated in National AI Literacy Day on March 27 through a faculty professional development session added to the global PD library. The CTE webinar, "Conversations about AI: AI Companions and Student Mental Health" draws on EDSAFE AI Companions Task Force guidance to help faculty and counselors navigate AI companion use by young adults, including risk indicators and referral pathways.

The Fellow program published [The Learn-It-All Educator](#): "A Guidebook for Training Brains, Not Replacing Them" grounded in faculty conversations, student interviews and classroom experience at LCC. Its Cognitive Gym model treats AI as a tool for building critical thinking skill like a muscle. The guidebook reached 1,380 downloads in the first 45 days.

When LCC introduced AI policy language in syllabi, faculty responded with clear positions: 46% prohibited AI, 49% permitted it with restrictions, and 5% actively encouraged integration. That data became the foundation for "Red Light, Yellow Light, Green Light: What 1,187 Faculty Decided about AI in Their Classrooms," published in the [Community College Journal](#), the flagship publication of the American Association of Community Colleges.

The program also delivered a Google NotebookLM webinar demonstrating how course materials can become multimodal learning resources, including a video artifact on mental health narrated as if explaining to a Golden Retriever, illustrating how creative framing increases curiosity and learning. The recording and artifact are available at ai4teaching.openlcc.net.

Central Bound

On March 3, the "Michigan Reconnect Mixer: Degree Check and Connect" event was held in Gannon Room 2214. The event provided Michigan Reconnect students an opportunity to review their academic progress with an Academic Advisor and connect with fellow participants. Academic Success Coaches and a MiLEAP Reconnect Navigator were also present to offer support. A total of 15 students attended, engaging with staff, receiving advising, and enjoying pizza and community.

On March 25, 68 students and employees attended the Living Stories event. Living Stories consisted of a collection of real people, LCC students and employees, with real stories to tell. Visitors selected a "story" and then sat down with that person to hear their story, listen, talk and learn. The stories ranged from light hearted to serious and focused on stories that break down stereotypes, clarify misconceptions or provide a unique perspective.



These projects were completed in DMAC 120, taught by Jeff Hamlin, and reflect the program’s emphasis on effective storytelling as both an artistic discipline and a professional skill. Students are trained to research, frame and communicate complex issues with clarity, accuracy and purpose - skills that are essential in media, communications and civic engagement.

The event took place on the second floor of the TLC building. The event was a collaboration between the Library and Learning Commons with additional assistance from Professor Isaac Reimer and Counseling Services.

Students from Lansing Community College earned top honors at the 2026 Michigan Student Broadcast Awards, presented by the Michigan Association of Broadcasters. This statewide recognition places LCC students among Michigan’s leading emerging broadcast and media professionals.

The students utilized equipment purchased through Perkins funding in the production of their work, demonstrating the direct impact of workforce investment on hands-on learning, creative problem-solving and professional readiness.

This recognition affirms the strength of Lansing Community College’s career-focused programs, the expertise of its faculty, and the college’s commitment to preparing students who can communicate meaningfully, ethically and effectively in the communities they serve.



LCC’s Japanese II class hosted a special tea presentation during class on March 2. Mr. Takanobu Ito, the tea official of Shiga Prefecture, was visiting various Michigan locations to talk about tea, including the Detroit Institute of Arts. LCC was the only Lansing stop. Instructor Bridget Cooper researched and arranged the presentation for LCC students and guests. Mr. Ito was joined by Ms. Keiko Nakajima, the Shiga Representative to the State of Michigan, and Ms. Yuki Kanemura, the Shiga Prefecture promotion coordinator. The presentation included tea tasting and insights into tea as part of Japanese culture.



The Coalition for College and Career Readiness (C3R) hosted the Ready for Launch event on March 6, 2026, at Lansing Community College’s Downtown Campus. The event was designed to support prospective neurodivergent students by providing resources, guidance, and strategies to help them succeed at LCC.

Approximately 52 participants attended the event, including 31 students. The strong turnout reflects growing interest in creating a more inclusive and supportive environment for all students.

The event began with a presentation by Sarah Garcia-Linz, Interim Associate Dean of the Center for Academic and Career Pathways (CACAP), followed by presentations from both internal and external volunteers who contributed to the program's success.

Participants engaged in a series of informative and interactive sessions, including:

- + Two student testimonials sharing the experiences of neurodivergent students at LCC
- + Academic Success Coaching resources
- + Information from the Center for Student Access and Accommodations
- + Financial aid and scholarship guidance
- + A campus Tour

Overall, Ready for Launch provided valuable information and meaningful connections for incoming students and their families. The event highlighted LCC’s commitment to supporting neurodivergent students and fostering a welcoming and inclusive campus community.

Pop-Up Food Pantry

LCC's Pop-Up Food Pantry was established in February 2023 to address the immediate needs of food-insecure students as part of LCC's commitment to student success. The pantry aims to provide students with free, shelf-stable, nutritious food to ensure that hunger does not become a barrier to their education while on campus. To preserve dignity, students are not asked to prove hardship and are not asked to provide their names. Food is available at all campus locations.

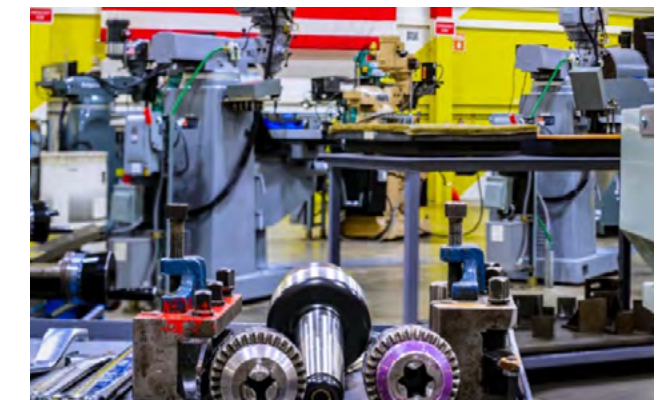
West Campus Technical Careers Hosts Engaging, Hands-On Tours for Community Partners

BCI Provides Two Open Enrollment Opportunities

BCI opened its course on Effective Leadership to interested members of the community. The class, held at West Campus, was tailored toward those ready to lead through effective, goals-oriented decision making. This course was ideal for those seeking advanced leadership training and covered topics such as workplace behavior and communication styles, driving change, setting goals, attitudes, coaching, and trust.

BCI also conducted State of Michigan court reporter certification exams at Schoolcraft College in Livonia during the week of March 16-20. By partnering with Schoolcraft College, BCI was able to fully utilize the Vistatech Center to successfully deliver court reporter exams in a Metro Detroit location. Schoolcraft College's events and IT teams were very helpful in ensuring smooth installation of required software and in providing support on the testing days.

BCI Provides Electrical Fundamentals Training to Block Imaging

This course for Block Imaging employees in Holt covered the basics of AC (Alternating Current) and DC (Direct Current) theory and fundamentals. Participants first gained an understanding of the concepts of electrical schematics, components, voltage, current and resistance. These fundamentals were then applied through Ohms Law to basic circuit design and analysis.



BCI Trains Dean Transportation in First Aid and CPR

BCI continues to provide CPR and School Bus Health Care training to Dean Transportation School Bus Drivers. This month, training included Heartsaver® First Aid, CPR and AED. Dean employees also received customized School Bus Health Care training to prepare them with as many necessary skills as possible to prevent and/or respond to situations they may encounter with their riders.



BCI Provides Two Trainings to Gestamp Leadership in Procurement and Supply Chain Training to Gestamp – Mason, MI

BCI provided two online trainings for employees of Gestamp in Mason.

The first, Leadership in Procurement and Supply Chain, focused on leadership skills essential for procurement professionals, based on the Leadership Mind Map framework. It integrated core leadership traits, decision-making, strategic thinking, financial management, technology trends and supply chain management principles.

The second, Mastering Import and Export Management and Trade Compliance, equipped procurement and supply chain professionals with a comprehensive understanding of international trade. Participants learned about customs procedures, tariff classifications, trade agreements and how to navigate global supply chain challenges.



BCI Provides Navigating Beyond Conflict Training to LCC Employees

BCI worked with LCC's Student Affairs Division, highlighting actions leaders can take to build and maintain trust, avoid trust breakers, and foster collaboration. Strengthening trust supports problem-solving, innovation and a healthier team environment.

Science and Mathematics Faculty Enjoy Statewide Conference

Five Science and Mathematics faculty, representing Biology, Physics and Chemistry, attended March's Michigan Science Teacher's Association's (MSTA) annual conference in Kalamazoo.

LCC's participants – Ali Ghorbanpour, Ed Kabara, Mindy Wilson, Zach Hatten and Lu Anne Cuthbert – networked and attended keynote and breakout sessions on all aspects of science teaching. They also visited different vendors to see the newest items in science teaching and share ideas.

During the conference, Professor and Coordinator of LCC's Biotechnology Program Dr. Mindy Wilson presented a workshop alongside Dr. Anna Feitzinger, CSH Laboratory, New York. The workshop, titled "DNA Subway 2.0, Bioinformatics for All of Us," equipped participants with the confidence and practical skills needed to incorporate genomics and bioinformatics into research and educational settings. Through hands-on experience, attendees learned to import and organize genomic data, run core analysis workflows, multiple sequence alignment, phylogenetic tree construction, and interpret the resulting outputs to draw meaningful biological conclusions. By applying these workflows to authentic biological questions, such as insect species identification, participants gained both technical competency and a deeper understanding of genomics concepts, enabling them to effectively integrate these tools into classroom activities or research projects.

This presentation is part of the effort to make bioinformatic analysis accessible to everyone. DNA Subway is free and available on the internet and can be used on mobile devices as well as computers.

Physics Faculty Attend National Summit

Full-time Physics Faculty Bryan Stanley attended the American Physical Society (APS) Global Physics Summit in Denver, Colorado, on March 15-20. As a part of the summit, he worked as the external evaluator for Squishy Science Sunday, a hands-on physics public engagement facilitated by APS members. The event took place at the Denver Museum of Nature and Science.

At the summit, Bryan also served as a panelist for the session titled "Public Engagement is Essential to Physics: Steps for Shifting the Culture." The panel argued that in order to reach the full civic and scientific potential of physics, the physics profession needs to undergo a culture change to recognize informal physics education (also referred to as public engagement or outreach) as an essential disciplinary practice. That is, engaging in informal physics education is part of what it means to "do physics."

The panel session further explored the recommendations for fostering this cultural shift that are reported in a white paper from the June 2024 Summit of the Joint Network for Informal Physics Education and Research (JNIPER), of which the panelists are co-authors.

Wilson Talent Center Students Visit Science Department

On March 20, LCC Science Department program advisors welcomed 30 high school juniors and seniors from the Bio-Science Careers program at the Wilson Talent Center. Students toured and explored West Campus, then came downtown to tour the chemistry and biotechnology labs.

Students also enjoyed presentations from:

- + Lu Anne Cuthbert on Vet Nursing and Ag Tech (two programs operated in cooperation with MSU)
- + Kirsten Wright on Conservation and Sustainability
- + Bruce Farris on Chemical Technology
- + Mindy Wilson on Biotechnology

Students made many connections and left with an enthusiasm for LCC as well as a little bit of swag – Science Department water bottles and a (very popular!) souvenir duck.

This event was organized collaboratively with Wilson Talent Center's Toby West as well as LCC's Dorothy Tappenden, Allison Snyder and Taylor Vaught.



Science Program Joins Program and Career Showcase

Three Science Program advisors manned tables at the LCC Program and Career Showcase at West Campus on March 25. Rob Halgren, Jennifer Lathom and Lu Anne Cuthbert displayed curricular guides, fossils, globes, glowing rocks, bones and other demos to highlight career options available with an LCC science education. Course options were discussed for geology, conservation and sustainability, engineering, biotechnology, geography, biology, chemistry, and pre-medical studies. Students also expressed

interest in our MSU partnerships in Vet Nursing and Agriculture Technology, and Cuthbert and Halgren spent quite a bit of time discussing orchids, farm animals and career options with two seniors interested in agriculture careers.

Students had a blast with Lathom's "Pin Your Favorite Great Lake" activity and discussing options in geography, geology and sustainability. Social Media Analytics Key

Total Posts

How many times a video, image, tweet, article, etc., was sent out on a given social media platform that month.

Follower +/-

How many users that decided to follow or unfollow a social media page in a given month for each platform.

Reach

A metric that refers to the number of users who have encountered a particular content on a social media platform.

Total Monthly Reach

This metric is estimated by each platform. It is a give-or-take of how many users in total viewed any content from a social media page that month. It shows roughly how big of a net is being cast.

Average Reach per Post

This is not an estimate like the "Total Monthly Reach" stat. This is calculated by taking the reach for each post that month and then dividing it by the total number of posts that month. It gives an idea of how many users, on average, came across a post from a given platform that month.

Engagements

Engagements are generally defined as when someone interacts with a post. What constitutes an engagement varies by platform. Examples of engagements include liking a post, commenting, sharing, saving, clicking on a link, clicking on an image, or re-sharing a post.

Total Engagements

The total sum of engagements for each post from each platform in a given month.

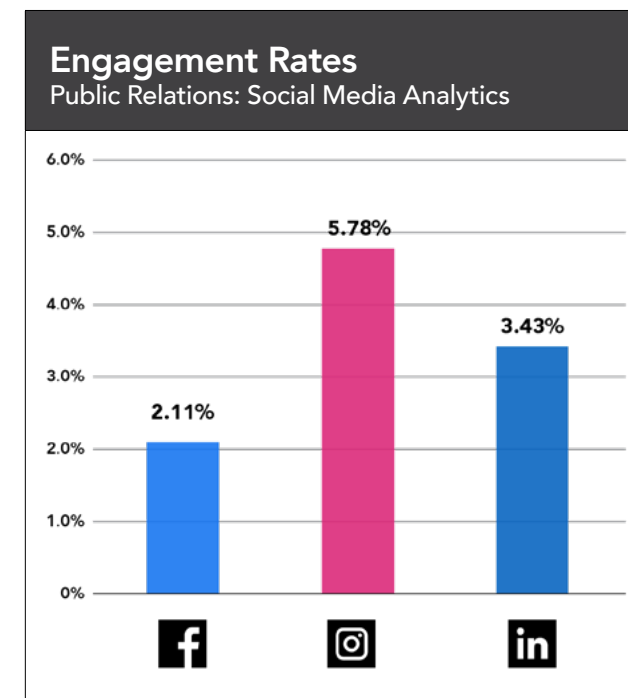
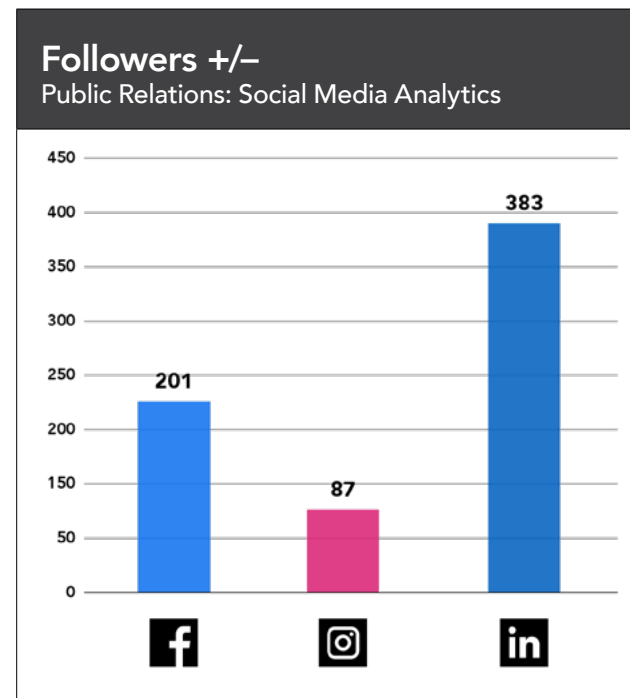
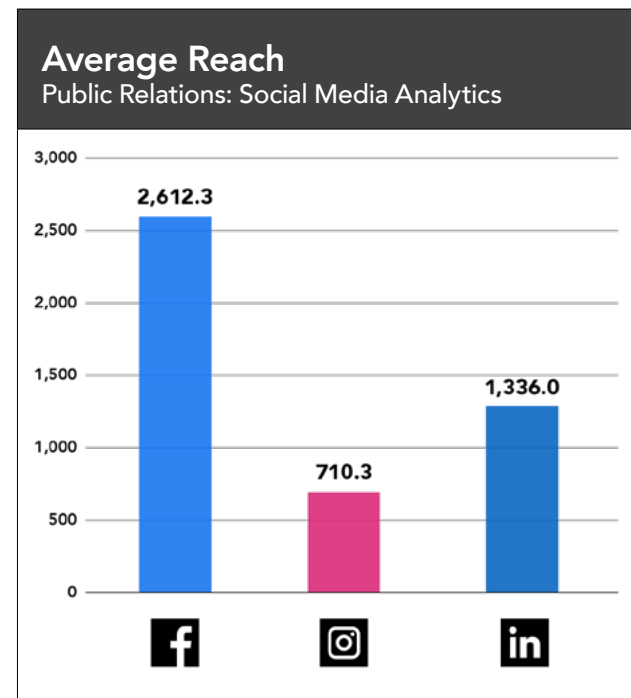
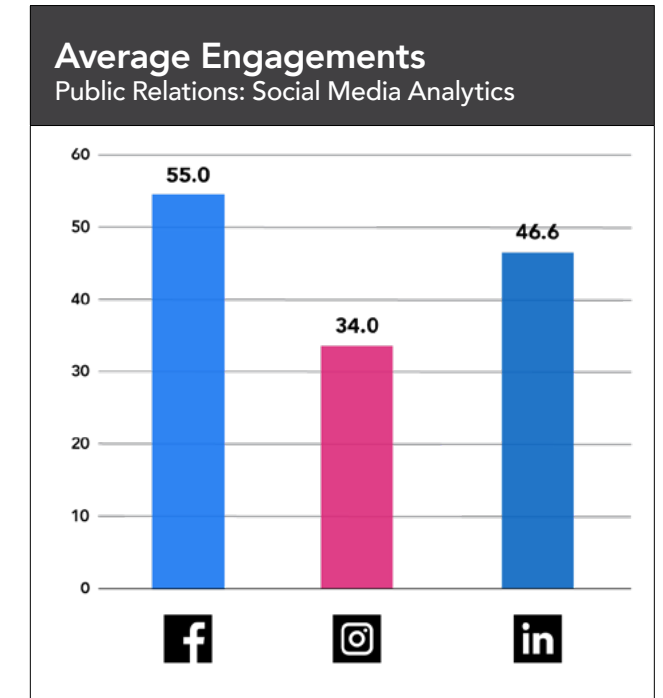
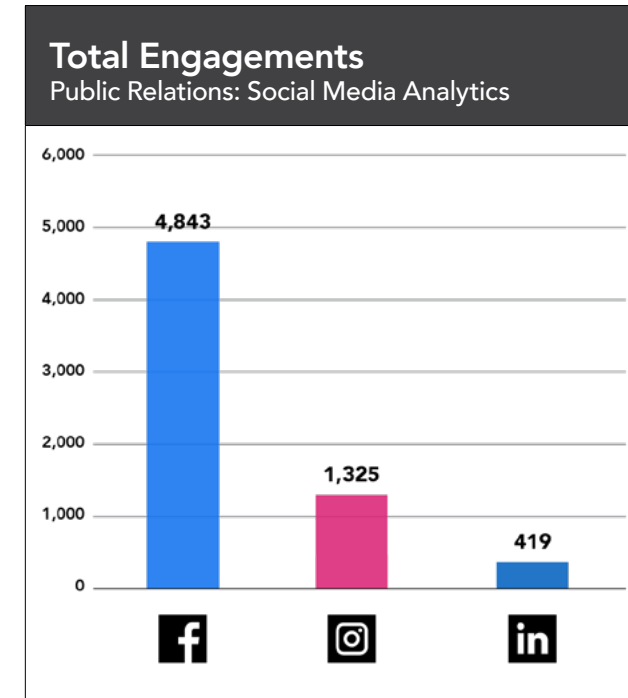
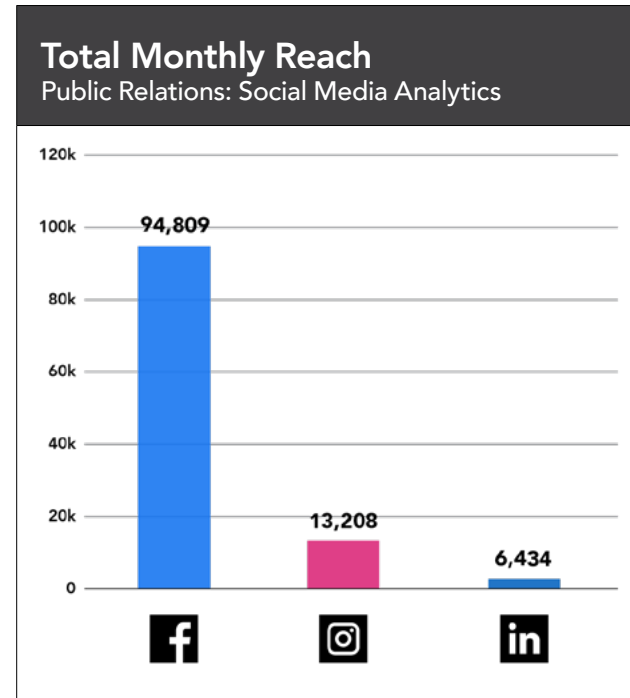
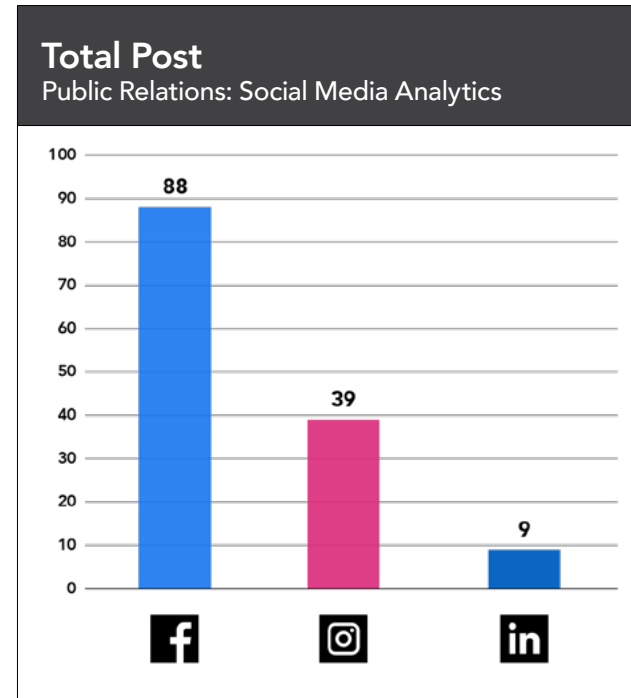
Average Engagements

'Total Engagements' divided by 'Total Posts' for each platform. Gives an idea of how many interactions from users/followers one could expect for an average post during the month for the specified platform.

Engagement Rate

Also referred to as Engagement Rate by Reach (ERR). This divides the 'Average Engagements' metric by the 'Average Reach per Post' metric. Essentially, this measures the percentage of users who chose to interact with a post after seeing it on the specified platform.

LCC hosts Equal Pay Day Event

Lansing Community College hosted its annual Equal Pay Day event on Thursday, March 26, at the Downtown Campus.

Equal Pay Day is an annual observance that highlights the ongoing pay disparity and wage gap between men and women. On average, women earn less than their male counterparts, and the gap is even wider for women of color. The date itself illustrates how far into the year women need to work to earn as much as men did during the previous year.

The guest speaker was Paula Cunningham, State Director for AARP Michigan. Cunningham was the first woman to serve as president of Lansing Community College and is the namesake of LCC's Administration Building. She delivered powerful remarks on equal pay and its impact on women in the workforce.

Attendees were asked to wear red to symbolize how much further women are 'in the red' compared to their male colleagues.

More than 100 employees attended the event.

Trustee Chatum Taylor delivered the welcome, and Chair Angela Mathews introduced Paula Cunningham.

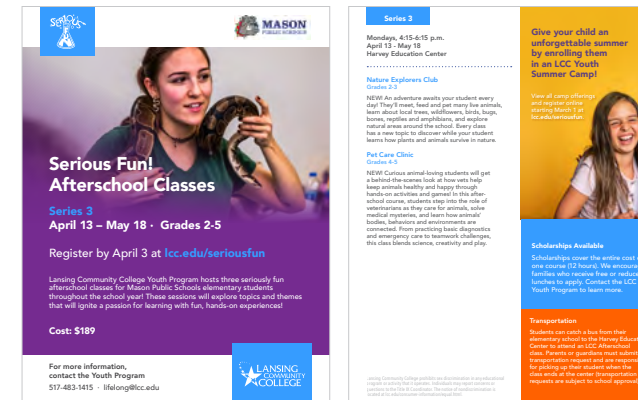

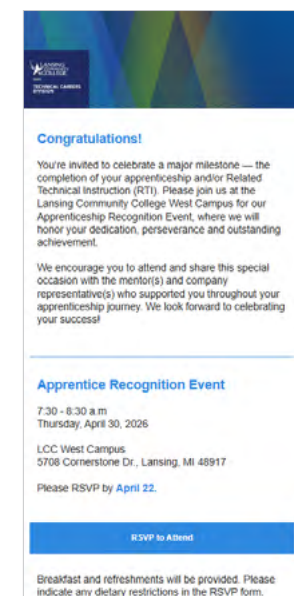
Youth Program's Mason School District Afterschool Youth Classes

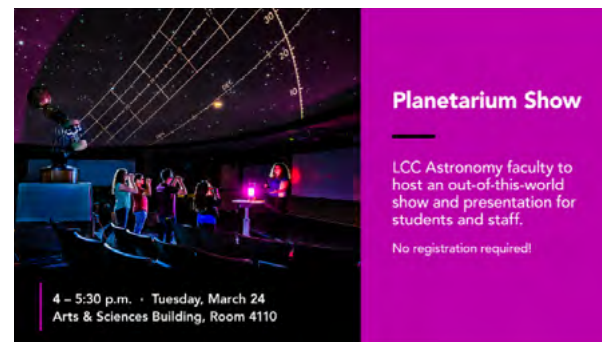
Graduation Tote Bags

Rohlf now meets weekly with the Compliance Office and IT to assess

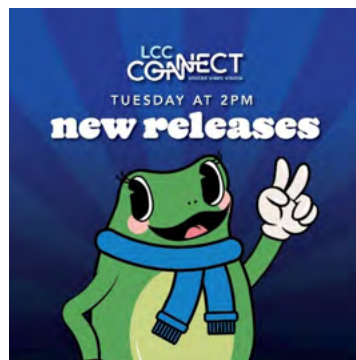
