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### Accreditation Liaison Officer becomes HLC Panel Lead

LCC's ALO, Psychology Professor Mark Kelland, has recently been invited to serve as a panel lead for Substantive Change Panels. Substantive change is the process institutions follow when proposing new academic programs or significant changes to their academic programming, and serves to ensure high-quality education. A panel lead coordinates the work done by each panel, mentors new panel members, and serves as the contact point between the panel, HLC, and the institutions whose proposals are in discussion. Professor Kelland has served as a member of HLC's Peer Corps since 2018, and was invited to serve as a Peer Review Team Chair in 2024.

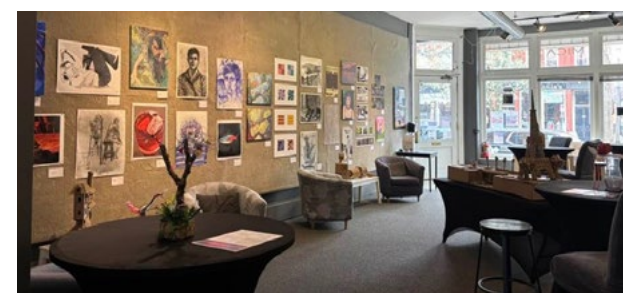
### PA End of Semester Performances Shared with Community

### First Student Art Exhibition

100 artworks by 60 LCC students were on display April 24-May 1 for LCC's First Annual Student Art Exhibition at the Michigan Institute for Contemporary Art (MICA) Gallery in Old Town Lansing. Art and Design faculty selected works created by their students in classes during the fall 2025 and spring 2026 semesters, including drawings, paintings, digital art and three-dimensional pieces. The exhibition was a valuable experience for students to have their artwork professionally showcased and viewed by the public. For the closing night reception on May 1, family and friends lined the sidewalk waiting to attend. More than 100 people mingled throughout the evening, and there were many happy conversations and proud photos. The Art and Design Program plans to make this an annual event every spring. Terry Terry, MICA's co-founder and board president, has already invited LCC to return in 2027. The exhibition was organized by Art and Design faculty Andrew Elsten, Laurie Bishop, lead faculty Susan Hardie, and Arts Outreach Coordinator Melissa Kaplan.



### STARSCAPES

Drawing hundreds of visitors, the Spring 2026 StarScapes featured a wide variety of projects presented by more than 200 students from across campus on April 29 and 30 on the Gannon Highway and in GB 2214. Held each fall and spring during the 15th week of the semester, StarScapes Student Innovation and Creativity Showcase is open to all LCC students and features displays, demonstrations, and presentations over the two-day event. Students may also post projects at [StarScapes Online](#) which this semester explored such topics as pollution, civil rights and Xray imagery. In person, students participated this semester from programs including Anthropology, Art and Design, Biology, English, Geospatial Science, Physical Fitness, Physics and Sociology, with the Vinyl Record Club providing music at the in-person event. The StarScapes Steering Committee includes faculty Jeff Janowick, Melinda Wilson, Danielle Savory, Sharon Hughes, Christopher Manning, Diane Snyder and Elizabeth Robison, and staff member Melissa Kaplan.



### Celebrating the 2025-2026 CTE Faculty Fellows

The Center for Teaching Excellence is proud to recognize five faculty members who served as CTE fellows from fall 2025 to spring 2026. Their work focused on practical, peer-led professional development that supports student success.

### New Faculty Orientation and Onboarding

Tamra Hunt facilitated New Faculty Orientation with 48 faculty across in-person and online formats. She incorporated interactive activities and a focus on Universal Design for Learning into orientation. She also represented the CTE on one of the Neurodivergent-Friendly Campus workgroups and facilitated workshops on inclusive teaching.

### Data Analytics for Faculty Development

Tyler Pham revised, distributed and analyzed a survey completed by 100 faculty members to identify faculty professional development needs. The survey will be conducted every 2 years. Their analysis of Professional Activity Days feedback ensures that LCC's faculty professional development remains relevant and high-impact. Tyler also facilitated a workshop on classroom management strategies to support faculty in the classroom.

### Open Educational Resources (OER)

Denise Warner helped launch the Textbook Affordability Project, broadening the college's focus to include library and open-access materials alongside OER. She also created a new workflow using

AI to help faculty discover relevant, low-cost resources. OER adoption has saved LCC students more than \$9 million in the past 10 years, and this initiative ensures that impact will continue to grow.

### Teaching with Artificial Intelligence (AI)

Szymon Machajewski facilitated ten workshops on AI and teaching ranging from ethical aspects to practical steps. He published an OER text on the subject, created and wrote for the [Teaching with AI Technology blog](#), and wrote an article in the Community College Journal. His work connected LCC to national resources, and Szymon provided faculty with direct consultations on navigating AI in the classroom.

### Faculty Career Development

Kandy Patrick focused on the faculty experience and supporting long-term career advancement. She partnered with Human Resources to explain the "change in status" process and facilitated workshops on professional branding and peer teaching observations. She also provided one on one consultations to help faculty prepare for these career transitions.

### Science and Mathematics (SAM) are knocking it out of the park

SAM finished the spring semester with a grand slam homerun, keeping students, faculty and the community engaged to the very end with outreach, student activities, and professional activities.

### Science and Math held Science Snacktivities during Finals Frenzy

Playing with your food has never been so much fun!

The Science and Math faculty hosted an event proving that the best way to a student's brain is through their stomach. Attendees got a literal taste of earth science by decorating (and swiftly eroding) Michigan Geology sugar cookies, followed by a study of geometric tessellation using Goldfish crackers. Additionally, a prize-wheel challenge served as a catalyst for discussions on scientific concepts, academic advising resources and student planning tools.

The well-attended event successfully strengthened community ties and facilitated meaningful networking among students, faculty and staff.



### Science and Math Hosted a Table at the Lugnugs Stadium School Games

The Lansing Lugnugs requested that LCC provide STEM activities for their Grand Slam School Day. The program quickly assembled and coordinated multiple interactive supply kits appropriate for the middle school students and this initiative expanded into a fantastic cross-departmental effort, as OE also provided volunteers

Thanks to this team's work, the Lugnugs invited LCC back for future events. Since then, SAM has returned for two more Grand Slam School Days and look forward to more.



### Downtown Campus Outdoor Walk during PA Days

The inspiration for the project struck during a class field trip led by Geology Professor Kirsten Wright. "I looked across the Capitol lawn and noticed another LCC class," Wright recalled. "They were studying history, while we were focusing on geology."

It turned out that the other class was led by History Professor David Siwick, who eagerly agreed to partner on a joint initiative. To bring an artistic element to the project, they expanded the collaboration to include Bruce Mackley, a key figure in several of campus placemaking projects. Together, the team applied this concept of "same place, different perspectives" to launch a combined, group-led field trip across LCC's Downtown Campus.

## Biology at the MSU Recycling Facility

During the week of May 4, the environmental biology 120 courses took a field trip to the MSU recycling and surplus facilities to see how MSU contributes to diverting waste out of landfills. Students were able to see how the facilities operate and were introduced to the vermiculture worms that are used for composting organic waste.



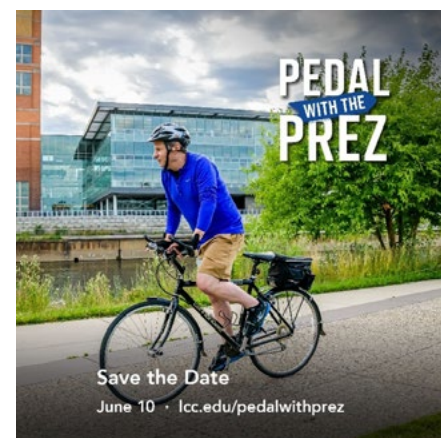
## Marketing Department Highlights

## National Apprenticeship Week, 2026

National Apprenticeship Week is a nationwide celebration led by the U.S. Department of Labor which took place April 26–May 2, 2026, under the theme “America at Work: Making America Skilled Again through Registered Apprenticeship.” The week was designed to highlight Registered Apprenticeships as a pathway to developing a skilled workforce through paid, high-quality, in-demand careers. The apprenticeship model combines academic instruction with paid, supervised fieldwork, allowing apprentices to earn while they learn.

In anticipation of National Apprenticeship Week, LCC President Steve Robinson signed a proclamation for NAW which stated, “Lansing Community College recognizes that Registered Apprenticeship, a proven and industry-driven training model, can train our workforce and build a pipeline into good, quality jobs in order to address our nation’s pressing workforce challenges such as rebuilding our country’s infrastructure, addressing critical supply chain demands, supporting a clean energy workforce, modernizing our cybersecurity response, and responding to care economy issues.”

This year, LCC staff and administrators participated in a variety of apprenticeship events. Dr. Will Emerson took part in MCAN’s Educated Workforce Summit. He later attended the Workforce Development’s Institute’s Race to Talent event, which featured the Department of Labor and Economic Opportunity’s State Apprenticeship Expansion Team, Capital Area Michigan Works and the State of Michigan Director of US Department of Labor. Kelsey Lorichon, of Tech Careers, visited the [Bekum America Corporation](#) to give them certificates of recognition

for completing their classroom training. Both Kelsey and Will participated in the Wilson Talent Center Apprenticeship/ Job Fair where they met with dozens of students who were interested in learning more about apprenticeships, including how apprenticeships have expanded to the fields of healthcare and emergency response.

## Honor’s Scholarship Graduate

The Honors Scholarship Program is facilitated by Ann Selleck and Dr. Dina Krois from Arts and Sciences. The Golden Tassel is awarded to Honors Scholarship Graduates. Students are selected for the 2-year Honors Scholarship Program based on merit. These students have completed 6 honors courses, maintained a 3.2 Cumulative GPA while participating in honors activities and completing an optional class including community service.



## Theatre Program Expands Summer Course Offerings

The theatre program has expanded summer course offerings for the first time since 2019. In an effort to increase enrollment and become more accessible to the community and high school students, the program is now offering Stage Combat and Stage Makeup courses. Both courses filled early, in addition to the standard on-line offering of Introduction to Theatre. While both of these courses are required for students pursuing their AFA, they are open to any student or community member interested.

## Theatre Program Holds Advising Day

The theatre program held an advising day for theatre majors registering for the summer and fall 2026 semesters. Lead Theatre Faculty Blake Bowen met with the majority of theatre majors for one-on-one advising. The advising day event, held every semester, brings all theatre majors and potential theatre majors together in the same room to learn about the program, classes, meet faculty and learn about upcoming performing arts events.

Eighteen students attended the event to complete their registration. Representatives from Advising and Financial Aid were there to answer questions and work with students individually.

## Pop-Up Food Pantry

LCC’s Pop-Up Food Pantry was established in February 2023 to address the immediate needs of food-insecure students as part of LCC’s commitment to student success. The pantry aims to provide students with free, shelf-stable, nutritious food to ensure that hunger does

not become a barrier to their education while on campus. To preserve dignity, students are not asked to prove hardship and are not asked to provide their names. Food is available at all campus locations.

### HHS Introduces Wellness Resources to Support Students During Finals Week

During this year's finals week, the HHS Empowerment Committee launched two new wellness and mindfulness initiatives aimed at supporting students during one of the most demanding periods of the semester. From April 27 through May 12, students visiting the HHS Building had access to two dedicated spaces designed to promote calm, reflection and encouragement.

The **Affirmations Tree**, located on the Garden Level near the Veterans Memorial, served as a meaningful point of connection. Students were invited to take or leave handwritten messages of encouragement, creating a growing collection of supportive notes. Many students contributed their own words of motivation, helping foster a sense of community during a stressful time.

Additional wellness spaces, known as **Zen Tables**, were placed on the Garden Level as well as the first and second floors. These small stations offered quiet, grounding areas where students could pause between study sessions. Each table included de-stressing items, coloring sheets and breathing exercises, all intended to help students reset and recharge.

Both initiatives were well received and provided students with accessible ways to manage stress throughout finals week. The Empowerment Committee plans to continue exploring opportunities to support student well-being in the coming school year.



### Lansing Tech Health Sciences Students Explore HHS Programs

Nineteen students from Lansing Tech's Health Sciences program visited the HHS Building this week for an immersive look at healthcare careers and academic pathways at LCC. The visit offered students a hands-on introduction to several programs and learning spaces across the division.

During their time on campus, students participated in an interactive session with the Radiologic Technology Program, where current rad tech students demonstrated imaging techniques and skills used in clinical practice. The group also joined Nursing students to review proper handwashing procedures and explore essential tools used in patient care.

Students additionally had the opportunity to try equipment used by Massage Therapy students and tour several kinesiology specific facilities, including the Fitness Center Weight Room and the kinesiology lab. In each presentation, faculty highlighted career opportunities and the academic preparation required for success.

The visit provided a valuable glimpse into the wide range of health sciences programs available at LCC and helped students envision future pathways in the healthcare profession.

**LCC Participates in Second ARISE Graduation at Ingham County Jail**

On May 21, the Ingham County Jail hosted a celebration to recognize GED completers as well as eight students who completed programs offered through LCC.

Over the past year, LCC has expanded its educational programming at the jail, building on the success of the inaugural Certified Logistics Associate program while introducing new opportunities through OSHA 30 and Certified Logistics Technician certifications. In addition, LCC piloted ACAD 100, a credit-bearing introduction to college course designed to support students in beginning their higher education journey.

Those recognized at the celebration completed at least one of these programs, with several individuals earning multiple credentials. LCC attendees included Board of Trustees Chair Angela Mathews, Dean of Community Education and Workforce Development Lee Gardner, and Job Training Center Director John Thomas Adams. Chair Mathews addressed the completers,

offering words of encouragement and reinforcing the importance of continuing their positive momentum.

LCC and the Ingham County Jail look forward to strengthening this growing educational partnership and expanding opportunities for learners in the years ahead.



**Business and Community Institute (BCI) Trains Dean Transportation in First Aid, CPR, AED and School Bus Health Care**

BCI continues to provide CPR and School Bus Health Care training to Dean Transportation bus drivers. This month, training included Heartsaver® First Aid, CPR and AED. Dean employees also received customized School Bus Health Care training to prepare them with as many necessary skills as possible to prevent and/or respond to situations they may encounter with their riders.



### BCI Trains LCC Employees

BCI delivered training to LCC’s Business Operations Division on “Leading from Any Position, Strengthening Influence, Communication and Workplace Effectiveness.” Through guided reflection and discussion, participants explored how professionals can lead from their position and how influence operates across roles throughout the division. One of the major outcomes was recognizing how assumptions and workplace perceptions influence collaboration.

BCI also delivered “Strategies for Influencing Others” to LCC’s Student Affairs Division, providing tools to present ideas persuasively, overcome resistance and win support. The training also focused on communication techniques that inspire action and build alignment across teams.

### BCI Provides Court Electronic Operator Exam Prep Course and Exam

This open enrollment exam preparation course helped participants gain the knowledge and skills to become a Court Electronic Operator as it relates to court reporting in the State of Michigan. Successful completion of this course allowed participants to sit for the certification examination, held at the West Campus.



### BCI Provides Reyes Coca-Cola Bottling Training on Basic Welding

Reyes Coca-Cola selected the Business and Community Institute to deliver three sections of Basic Welding training to three groups of employees at its Portage, Indiana, location. The Basic Welding training included beginning theory and practice, and introduced safe operations and applications of welding. Practice consisted of utilizing methods of joining steel in the horizontal, flat and vertical positions. Destructive testing was also provided.



### BCI Provides Electrical Fundamentals Training to MWC in St. Johns

The BCI delivered electrical training in two cohorts for MWC/Glanbia personnel covering two shifts. This course covers the fundamentals of AC (Alternating Current) and DC (Direct Current) theory for individuals with little or no electrical experience. Participants learn electrical schematics, components, voltage, current, resistance and Ohm’s Law, along with basic circuit design and analysis. The course also explored power, magnetism, DC generation, AC/DC power supplies, digital meters and electrical symbols. Hands-on labs reinforced learning through series, parallel and series-parallel circuits while comparing calculated and measured values.

The exchange provided an opportunity to share best practices surrounding the co-location model of ERESA programs on LCC's campus and the impact this collaboration has on workforce development. Through partnerships like these, students gain increased access to hands-on training, college resources and career pathways that strengthen the local talent pipeline and support regional economic growth.

### LCC Professor of Cybersecurity Presents at Cybersecurity Symposium

Professor of Cybersecurity Jason Mitchell attended and presented at the 2026 Centers of Academic Excellence (CAE) in Cybersecurity Symposium held in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, from April 27-30. This national event brought together more than 800 attendees representing 459 institutions across the U.S.

As part of this national exchange, Mitchell presented a session titled "Closing the Readiness Gap: Preparing Community College Cybersecurity Students to Stand Out in a Crowded Entry-Level Job Market." His presentation focused on a critical shift occurring in the cybersecurity workforce. While institutions have successfully expanded the pipeline of technically trained graduates, employers are now facing a different challenge: distinguishing candidates who are truly prepared to operate in professional environments.

Participation in this symposium reinforced LCC's position within the national cybersecurity education community. Additionally, presenting at this conference elevated the visibility of LCC's program and contributed to the broader national conversation on improving cybersecurity workforce readiness.

## Social Media Analytics Key

### Total Posts

How many times a video, image, tweet, article, etc., was sent out on a given social media platform that month.

### Follower +/-

How many users that decided to follow or unfollow a social media page in a given month for each platform.

### Reach

A metric that refers to the number of users who have encountered a particular content on a social media platform.

### Total Monthly Reach

This metric is estimated by each platform. It is a give-or-take of how many users in total viewed any content from a social media page that month. It shows roughly how big of a net is being cast.

### Average Reach per Post

This is not an estimate like the "Total Monthly Reach" stat. This is calculated by taking the reach for each post that month and then dividing it by the total number of posts that month. It gives an idea of how many users, on average, came across a post from a given platform that month.

### Engagements

Engagements are generally defined as when someone interacts with a post. What constitutes an engagement varies by platform. Examples of engagements include liking a post, commenting, sharing, saving, clicking on a link, clicking on an image, or re-sharing a post.

### Total Engagements

The total sum of engagements for each post from each platform in a given month.

### Average Engagements

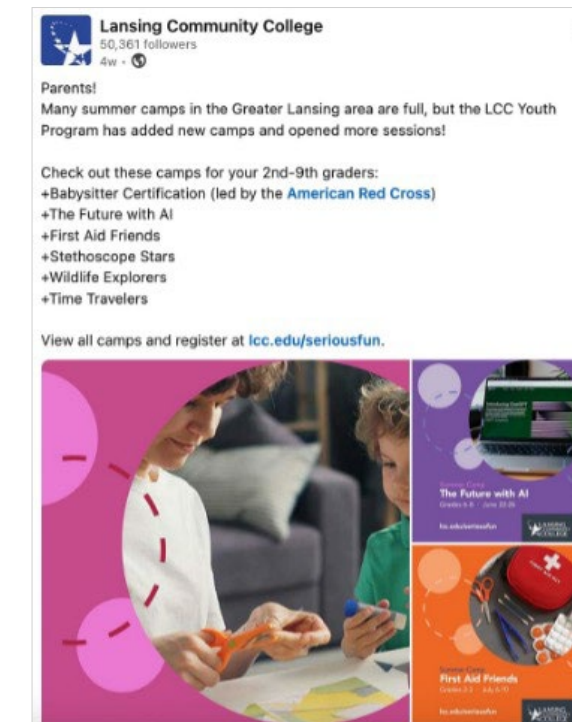
'Total Engagements' divided by 'Total Posts' for each platform. Gives an idea of how many interactions from users/followers one could expect for an average post during the month for the specified platform.

### Engagement Rate

Also referred to as Engagement Rate by Reach (ERR). This divides the 'Average Engagements' metric by the 'Average Reach per Post' metric. Essentially, this measures the percentage of users who chose to interact with a post after seeing it on the specified platform.

In April, the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) informed all of its accredited institutions that an update to the Mark of Accreditation was required and that it must be displayed on our websites. That task was assigned to Justus Rohlf in Marketing. After implementing the changes, Justus identified several critical violations of WCAG 2.1 AA compliance standards. HLC put him in contact with the vendor, and after a series of back-and-forth emails and troubleshooting, Justus and Yoshki Support resolved the violations. On behalf of LCC, Justus addressed a critical accessibility issue for all of HLC's accreditation institutions (approximately 950 colleges and universities).

## Honoring Estefania Reyes-Reynoso: MSU Master's Graduate

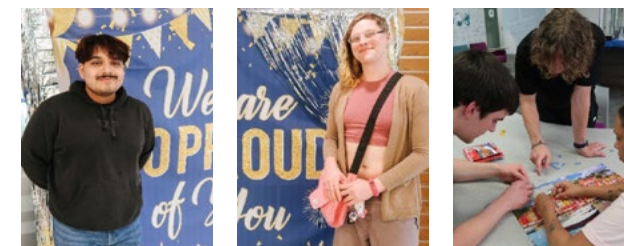
